

PREFACE

St. Agnes College (Autonomous), Mangaluru, the first women's college on the west coast of India, is a minority institution founded in 1921 by a great visionary, Mother Mary Aloysia of the Apostolic Carmel Congregation. She was the first woman recipient of the prestigious National Award, Kaiser-i-Hind Gold Medal of the First Class in 1929, by the then British Government for her contributions in the field of Women's Education. The institution has the vision of empowering women through value-based education, with special concern for the economically disadvantaged and first generation learners.

The mission of the Congregation is actualized in the institutional goals, administrative policies, academic programmes, co-curricular/extra-curricular activities, staff enrichment initiatives and student support systems. The ethical and moral formation of staff and students is seamlessly woven into the fabric of campus life. Innovation, student-centred modes of teaching/learning, extensive use of technological aids and research-based activities enrich the intellectual life on the campus.

The National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) awarded the institution with the Five Star status in 1999, an 'A' grade in 2005 and 'A' grade with CGPA 3.53 in 2012 respectively. In 2006, the institution was recognised as a College with Potential for Excellence by the UGC and subsequently in 2007, it was granted the Autonomous Status. With ninety five years of service, St. Agnes College, Mangaluru, has grown into a leading educational institution on the map of Higher Education in India.

The Self Study Report (SSR) is the criterion-wise compilation of the inputs, processes and outcomes of our endeavour towards quality sustenance and enhancement. We have made an earnest attempt to provide a compressive portrayal of the institution and its vision and mission which are in accordance with the core values enumerated by the NAAC. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY WITH SWOC ANALYSIS

Intelligence plus character – that is the goal of true education.

Almost a century ago, the vision of the Apostolic Carmel Congregation sowed the seeds of education in the fertile land of Mangaluru on the coastal belt of Karnataka, to hone intelligence and mould character. 'Alea iacta est,' (The die is cast) said Mother Mary Aloysia A. C. when she embarked upon a mission which the rest of the world considered impossible. Mother's vision was clear. She knew that the women of the West Coast Region of India needed education to forge ahead. As a result, St. Agnes College, Mangaluru, a Catholic minority institution and the first women's college in the whole of South India, came into existence way back in 1921. Since then, it has not looked back and has progressed in leaps and bounds. The college was mentored by the Madras University till it reached its Golden Jubilee year. Thereafter it advanced under the wings of the University of Mysore and is presently affiliated to Mangalore University. From 15 students, it has now reached the strength of 2189 (UG & PG) and from being an entirely women's Under Graduate college, it is now co-ed at the Post Graduate level. However, while keeping pace with the changes in higher education at the national and global level, it has retained its local flavour and continues to offer value-based education with a special focus on the underprivileged.

The proof of its adherence to standard lies in the milestone achievements the college is proud of:

• 1971 – Golden Jubilee

The college took the initiative to build **St. Agnes Special School** for the differently-abled, as a memorial of its Golden Jubilee.

• 1981 – Diamond Jubilee

The learning resources of the college got augmented with the construction of a new **Library**.

• 1996 – Platinum Jubilee

The college was hallowed by the visit of **St. Mother Teresa of Kolkota**. This period witnessed the introduction of a plethora of **new disciplines** like Microbiology, Electronics, Statistics, Computer Science and Computer Applications. It was a period of marked growth and change on the campus both structurally and academically.

- St. Agnes College has the pride of being the trail blazer as **the first college** under the Mangalore University to be **assessed and accredited by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council** (NAAC) with the Five Star Status in 1999, reaccredited with 'A' Grade in 2005 and 'A' Grade with CGPA 3.53 in 2012.
- 2006 Jimmy and Rosalynn Carter Partnership Award. The college won the prestigious International Award for the path-breaking work in the field of Watershed Management undertaken as Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR) which greatly benefitted villages in the suburbs of Mangaluru.

- The college was recognized as the College with Potential for Excellence (CPE) in 2006 by the University Grants Commission (UGC).
- To promote academic excellence in teaching and research, the Management of St. Agnes College applied for the status of academic autonomy and was one of the first colleges to be granted academic autonomy in 2007 under Mangalore University. The year also witnessed the establishment of the PG Programme.
- The college received the grant under the **Star College Scheme** from the Department of Biotechnology, Ministry of Science & Technology, Government of India in **2012**.
- The St. Agnes Centre for Post Graduate Studies and Research was recognised as the **Research Centre** by Mangalore University in **2015**.

While incorporating the changes demanded by the global and virtual world, the college has never sacrificed its stamp of originality, bedrock principles and quest for excellence. However, the college does not rest on its laurels and subjects itself to the litmus test of quality. Its endeavour is not to claim excellence, but to ensure that in its venture of courting excellence, it is on the right path.

The college has a sense of gratification that the values that it has upheld while imparting education to the seekers of knowledge snugly fit the description of the values outlined by the NAAC as the core values of education.

The college aims primarily at knowledge acquisition and skill building. Whether it is through intuitive, experiential or scholastic learning, education is oriented towards developing the effectiveness of an individual. However, education that focuses on the effectiveness of an individual without placing her in the larger framework of the nation would lose its perspective. That is why the college ensures that the students have their due share of contribution to make in nation building.

Ample opportunities come to students in the form of Co-Curricular (CC) and Extra-Curricular Activities (ECA) of NCC, NSS, Rangers, Red Cross and various other Cells and Associations to contribute their might towards nation building. As part of Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR), egalitarian spirit has been infused into the students by exposing them to the travails of the underprivileged through community service titled Agnes Towards Community (ATC). In addition, every year, the institutional best practice has been to raise funds through a Christmas programme called *Navidad* to build homes for the homeless.

While upholding the sense of social justice, the institution hasn't balked from opposing anti-social elements that have attempted to mar the dignity of

women. In the case of violence against innocent girls in a communally motivated act, the institution organised a widespread protest to show its solidarity with the aggrieved party by a procession. Women's empowerment has been the thrust area of concern of the institution.

The institution knows that we cannot prepare the future for our youth; but we can prepare our youth for the future.

Fostering Global Competencies Scaling up education to learn and to explore

The world now is looking for those graduates who possess the aptitude for management; graduates who are effective communicators; and leaders who are confident, friendly, flexible, comfortable with change; and work well in a busy team environment. However, as the usual thrust is accumulation of knowledge or information, the students who pass out of institutions do not display effectiveness in their functioning especially because they lack the necessary competencies. So it is the bounden duty of educational institutions to provide their pupils with not only knowledge but also skill. Hence it was the institution's focus on skill development that led to the introduction of the addon and certificate courses in addition to the revamping of the curriculum for skill enhancement. The college has MoUs with several industries and some courses have field work and project work as part of their syllabi enabling students to have hands-on experience. The Career Guidance and Placement Cell undertakes several certificate/diploma courses and coaching classes to achieve core competencies. Departments have tie-ups with industries for internship and undertake collaborative projects to enhance competent learning.

Inculcating a Value System Educating the mind without educating the heart is no education at all – Aristotle

While there is an attempt on the part of the institution to encapsulate ideas, strategies, methods and techniques to mould students into well-informed, competent individuals, one of the thrust areas is to hone the Social and Moral Quotient in students. Offering integral, value-based and quality-oriented learning experience in the classroom and beyond is the mission of the college. Moral education/Value Education classes and special programmes channelize the impetus of the institution to inculcate values in students. Cells and Associations such as Human Rights Education Cell/Harmony Club, special value education programmes such as skit competitions on the UN international theme for the year and value education projects on Eternal Values – Love, Justice, Peace and Truth keep the culture of value-oriented education alive on the campus. The focus is also on creating awareness among the public on safety, preservation of environment, protection of public health and adaptation of public ethical behavioural practices to be good citizens.

Promoting the Use of Technology Technology will not replace teachers; but teachers who use technology will probably replace teachers who don't

Providing the faculty and students with modern technology is the need of the hour because higher education with its focus on quality is unattainable without modernisation. In addition to the Information and Communication Technology (ICT) modules incorporated into teaching, to enrich the learning experiences of students and to make use of ICT optimally, the college has introduced Online Multiple Choice Questions (MCQ) as part of Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA), online attendance and more importantly online feedback from students. The electronic data management of the college includes an institutional website and ICT enabled administrative processes. The college has organised several Information Technology literacy programmes for the internal and external stakeholders to enhance access to electronic resources of the institution.

Quest for Excellence Excellence is the gradual result of always trying to do better

In its perennial quest for excellence the college has earnestly identified its own strengths and weaknesses in all that it does, and especially in the thrust areas of teaching and learning. The steering committee of the college monitors all the activities of the college to enhance and sustain quality, keeping in mind the development of the nation in general and the college in particular. The Inter-Disciplinary Board of Studies (IDBOS) monitors the Co-Curricular and Extra-Curricular Activities conducted by the college. The Student Cabinet is guided by the Vice Principal and the IQAC so that it strives for excellence in all the activities undertaken by it, in and outside the college. Feedback on various aspects of the college life by various stakeholders helps in ensuring that the vision of the college is kept in focus.

The Core Value upheld by the institution:

The college is of the firm conviction that unless individuals are encouraged to perceive the divine in themselves and in others, every other effort to make them academically competent, socially relevant and professionally skilled goes wasted. That is why the college is particular that students spend time on spiritual reflections made available to them through morning prayer sessions on the Public Address System (PAS), religion/moral education classes and other special programmes such as retreats and prayer days. The refrain that resounds in every nook and corner of the campus is *God is our strength*.

CRITERION-WISE REPORT

Curricular Aspect

The curriculum has been designed and developed keeping to the guidelines of the UGC and Mangalore University. Curriculum resources have been drawn from the rich expertise of both internal and external members on the Board of Studies (BOS). Major curriculum revision takes place once in three years and reviews are held every year keeping in mind the feedback from all stakeholders.

An Inter-disciplinary Choice-Based Curriculum at the PG level has been introduced making education more relevant with academic flexibility. At the UG level, Add-on/Certificate/Diploma Courses enhance the professional competency of students. B.Com. students now have the opportunity to pursue B.Com.+ACCA in association with the International Skill Development Corporation (ISDC), UK.

Teaching-Learning and Evaluation

Admission of students is done through a transparent admission procedure, keeping to the guidelines provided by the Karnataka State Education Board and other regulatory bodies. The college caters to students from diverse backgrounds with varied abilities. The constitution of the student population includes students from other states and NRIs. Meritorious students are given spot admission. Special concern and concession are shown to students from economically disadvantaged sections of society, first generation learners, sports achievers and SC/ST/OBC applicants. The profile of the students is maintained with the help of Smart Office Admin.

The college has taken a three-pronged approach to learning, keeping in mind three key components of education: Knowledge and Understanding, Skill and Ability, Attitude and Behaviour. Student-centric teaching methods have been augmented, learning fields have been expanded with internship/project work/assignment and progressive examination reforms have been brought into effect. Continuous Internal Assessment with innovative/research based assignments/MCQs has kept students on a steady process of learning. Participation in intra/intercollegiate competitions, research based activities, industrial visits, educational tours and exhibitions have made learning experiential.

At the time of recruitment of faculty, preference is given to Ph.D./NET/SLET applicants to ensure excellence in teacher quality. Orientation programmes for the new faculty and also on-going faculty development programmes enable the faculty members to improve themselves and disseminate the knowledge gained among students. This enhances the participation and presentation of papers in seminars and conferences at the national and international levels. The college has collaborated with institutions of national and international repute to upgrade the future prospects of students.

Research, Consultancy and Extension

The claim of quality enhancement wouldn't stand its ground without serious pursuits in the field of research. Hence it is the earnest endeavour of the institution to raise the bar by offering concrete guidance to the faculty in their research activities through minor/major research programmes. This endeavour is supported by the Research Committee which monitors the disbursement of the seed money to the management faculty for research activities. The college brings out annually an in-house journal which has contributions from the faculty of the college and other institutions. The recognition of the PG Departments as the Research Centre is a fillip to developing the research culture in the institution. The DBT, New Delhi sponsored Star College Scheme and other funding have strengthened research initiatives among the There and students. has been a considerable organising/attending research-oriented programmes and presenting/publishing research papers by both faculty and students. Consultancy and counselling offered by the faculty is a pointer to institution's social responsibility. Extension and outreach programmes, especially Agnes Towards Community (ATC) and Navidad, have transformed our students into concerned and committed citizens and have gained the appreciation of the public. In this phase, the College had the privilege of signing a number of MoUs and collaborating with academic and industrial organisations which has improved the prospects of students especially in the field of research.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The state-of-the-art infrastructure is the buzz phrase of the day. While it is true that every institution dreams of world class facilities, it is not possible for institutions with a modest fee structure to offer facilities which are not financially feasible. However, the college makes the optimal use of the resources available and imparts meaningful education. A centralised server system, connecting the entire campus, has enabled smooth and speedy administration. In addition to ICT enabled facilities like online submission of attendance, online MCQ tests and online evaluation of the faculty, the introduction of Davlin software has made it possible for parents/students to browse their attendance and performance. The college has maximised the use of the existing infrastructure and learning resources such as the Language Lab, Gymnasium, Agneseum and INFLIBNET-NLIST e-resources. The attempt of the college is to make the scenario conducive for teaching and learning. New constructions and timely renovation of the existing structures have ensured comfort and convenience for both faculty and students. Measures such as the installation of the CCTV and relocation of the Examination Centre have fortified security measures. A new Board Room has been set up and the IQAC centre has been renovated. The construction of the new gate is in line with the policy of the college to bring in necessary changes while retaining the traditional charm.

Student Support and Progression

A building of brick and mortar comes to life only when its human resource is brought to centre stage. It is here that the college shines like a Catherine Wheel. A very strong mentoring system, with every group of forty students being assigned a class teacher, has left the Grievance Cell and Student Wellbeing Centre with little work to do. Teachers act as barefoot counsellors offering their time selflessly for the emotional balance of students. Remedial/tutorial classes help in confidence building and bridging the academic gap that exists in a heterogeneous group.

Communication skills, critical thinking, problem solving and decision making abilities are tested and sharpened in the Continuous Internal Assessment assignments and activities of the various Cells and Associations.

A three-tiered leadership structure of class representatives, cabinet members and staff-in-charge ensures maximum participation of students in multifarious activities. With the spirit of inclusion, a wide range of activities involving the academic, the aesthetic and the spiritual is organised making the very ambience of education fecund. The intra-collegiate fest Insync and intra-collegiate National Level Fests – Agnofest and Avishkar have tapped the potential of advanced learners and turned them into efficient communicators, leaders and organisers who are able to face the challenges of life with zeal and maturity. Interdisciplinary projects under the STAR College Scheme of DBT, New Delhi and research collaborations have facilitated students to function as trainers and guides in academic activities of other institutions. Students have earmarked their excellence in academic, cultural, sports and social service fields by winning accolades.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The college revisited its Vision and Mission Statement after going on a journey of introspection. It brought in significant changes keeping in mind the demands of the changing times, without sacrificing the eternal values.

The Management remains committed to the ethos and aims of the institution. Ably guided and assisted by the Governing Council, the Academic Council, the Staff Council and the IQAC, the Management reaps the benefits of the experience and expertise of both internal and external stakeholders. Power and responsibility remain decentralised with the Principal being able to assign duties to the Vice-principal, the Controller of Examinations, the Deans and the Heads of Departments.

Faculty development plays a major role in the progress of an institution. The measures taken include incentives to the faculty in the form of increment with the acquisition of higher degrees; recognition for paper presenters; pedagogical training programmes such as orientation to the newly recruited faculty; input sessions for all the faculty members for gaining of knowledge; provision of access to technical/soft skills and programmes towards spiritual/moral well-being; deputation to participate in seminars/ symposia/

conferences/ workshops for knowledge enhancement and fellowship programmes to strengthen faculty bonding.

The links with the alumni and parents are cordial and add to the vitality of campus life. The Alumni conducts Soft Skill Development Workshops, Endowment Lecture, Women's Day Celebrations and the PTA is actively involved in NSS activities, Teachers' Day Celebrations and a host of other activities.

In addition to the financial assistance from the UGC and other funding agencies, the college is the beneficiary of munificence from banks, industries, parents, alumni and other benefactors for organising academic and outreach programmes and NSS camps.

The IQAC ably assisted by the Quality Circles has been efficiently carrying out its responsibilities. The college considers the Annual Academic Audit of the IQAC for quality initiatives, maintenance and sustenance its best practice.

Innovations and Best Practices

An institution will be able to envisage the bigger picture only when it is prepared to think out of the box and introduce innovations.

In its green initiative, the institution had to match its own bench mark of watershed management that earned it The Jimmy and Roselyn Carter Partnership International Award. Roof and rain water harvesting, bottle gardening, herbal garden, on-line MCQ test/ feedback and awareness programmes are the steps taken by the college in the sphere of eco-friendly activities.

In its Best Practice, the institution has outdone itself! Navidad – a Christmas fund raising programme to build a home for the homeless has kept the concept of Institutional Social Responsibility pulsating. This year the institution along with its sister organisations has launched a mega project of building five homes for the needy under the banner of *Agno Ashray*. Visits to the village affected by Endosulfan and interactions with the victims have made students contribute generously towards measures that can alleviate the suffering of the affected people. The most significant move has been to introduce Agnes Towards Community (ATC), a community involvement programme for the final degree students in association with NGOs. The institution has been honoured by Fr. Muller Medical College Hospital, Mangaluru for its sustained efforts in organising blood donation camps for the past 7 years and donating 80 to 100 pints of blood yearly to the hospital.

Education is the most effective facet of knowledge. It is in the field of education, more than any other, that the wisdom of the past gets redefined even as it is handed down from the present to the future. The ever changing state of knowledge keeps the arena of education pulsating and the defining part of excellence is the curriculum. In an autonomous set-up, curricular aspects gain wider significance and they have a sustained and substantial impact on how students think, act, and feel under the influence of teacher attributes. St. Agnes College has earnestly endeavoured to design and develop a challenging curriculum.

1.1 Curriculum Design & Development

1.1.1 How are the institutional vision/mission reflected in the academic programmes of the College/Department?

VISION

The Apostolic Carmel Higher Education for holistic development prepares the Agnesian students to be God-centred, academically competent, responsible citizens and effective leaders committed to serve the society.

Through Value Education/Religion/Moral education classes students enhance their spiritual, social and personal growth. The faculty members have prepared text books for Moral education and Value Education with a wide spectrum of topics. Students imbibe values through classroom teaching/practice, prayer, animation, discussion and project work.

Students of all faiths are brought together through inter-faith dialogues and study of various religions to inculcate a spirit of harmony and tolerance.

The college has the unique feature of morning prayer and input session on the Public Address System (PAS).

The College promotes sound social and family values through its curriculum enabling students to enhance their quality of life. The syllabus has been designed and developed so as to make available to the students an increasing array of opportunities for personal, emotional, intellectual, social, spiritual and holistic growth.

The curriculum also provides scope for development of analytical skills and reasoning through research-based assignments, project work, seminars, workshops, field trips and training programmes. Concern for the environment, society, women, children, the elderly and the underprivileged is achieved through enrichment programmes, community development activities, environment awareness programmes and visits to old-age homes/ hospitals/ orphanages.

To reinforce the curriculum, the students are provided with quality-oriented learning experience enabling them to qualify in competitive exams and secure employment.

Strengthen the faith life of the catholic students and keep alive the founding Charism of the Apostolic Carmel

Students participate in campus mass, regular prayer meetings and hours of prayer for their spiritual empowerment. Quiz on holy scriptures, catechism classes and enactment of parables heighten the religious fervour of the students. Annual retreats enrich the spiritual life of students.

Ensure commitment and pursuit of excellence in the staff

Input sessions on various topics at the beginning of every semester, organized by the IQAC, provide the required focus and orientation to the staff. Opportunities are given to teachers to organize and participate in national/international seminars/workshops to enhance teacher quality, develop skills and promote overall excellence. Involvement of faculty in research projects offers scope for innovative thinking, team work, experimentation, documentation and interpretation of results. Faculty and students make paper presentations honing their communication skills and critical thinking. The support staff also attend in-house input sessions and seminars/ workshops/ training outside college.

Promote and enhance national and international goals of Higher Education

To promote and enhance the goals of Higher Education, the various departments have upgraded the syllabi to meet the national and international requirements. As a result, the curriculum has the following progressive features:

- Presentation skills are honed through participation/organization/ presentation of papers in seminars/workshops/conferences/symposia

- Syllabi are skill-based
- IT oriented course material is promoted
- Hands-on Training Programmes are offered
- Project work is introduced
- Industrial/Hospital Internship is incorporated into the syllabi
- Language Proficiency Enhancing Programmes are conducted

Socially Relevant

- Extension programmes are incorporated
- Outreach programmes are held
- Extra-curricular activities are organised
- Rural exposure is provided
- Service learning is undertaken

Foster and intensify the goals of national integration, unity and harmony in diversity as well as personal and national leadership for service

The College through its units such as NCC, NSS, YRC, Rangers, Harmony Club and Spirituality Committee strives to inculcate in students the goals of national integration such as patriotism, service and tolerance.

NCC trains the students to be disciplined, adventurous and have the ability to cope with any kind of environmental stress. NSS works with the motto 'Not Me, But You' and attends to the needs of the villages chosen for the annual camp and surrounding communities with *shramadhan*, medical check-up camps and cleanliness drives. Harmony Club celebrates festivals of all religions and promotes inter-faith dialogues. AIDS Awareness Education Cell and YRC help in educating fellow students on Health/Hygiene and organise blood donation camps on the campus under the auspices of local hospitals/NGOs. Spirituality Committee takes charge of special programmes to heighten the spiritual quotient of students. Rangers Association has a special programme titled Traffic Warden Squad (TWS) in which students are trained in traffic signalling and traffic control by the traffic police and offer their services at important traffic junctions.

Develop convictions, and reinforce empowerment and action for restoration of women's dignity and human rights

Women's empowerment is the need of the hour and to achieve this, different measures have been implemented.

As a women's institution, the college reinforces gender parity. The need for equal opportunity is emphasised. Consequently, Women's Studies under the General Education Papers are pursued. In addition, students also study Human Rights, Indian Constitution and Environmental Studies honouring the Supreme Court's directive aiming at enlightening students.

The programmes conducted by Women's Cell and Human Rights Education Cell focus on women's welfare. Honouring women achievers, holding guest lectures by eminent women personalities, conducting awareness programmes for Self Help Groups (SHG) and sensitizing women on their rights. Celebration of International Women's Day in collaboration with Women's Studies Centre and the Alumni have been some of the other activities of the Cells. *Sumangala* - the Women's Centre runs *Spoorthi* and *Deepa* SHGs for the benefit of the local women. The Centre also caters to the needs of school dropouts and economically disadvantaged women by providing training in basics of computer, culinary skills and fashion designing.

Nurture eco-friendly culture with responsibility

The curriculum includes a paper on Environmental Studies which creates awareness on environmental issues/hazards and steps needed to preserve natural resources. Topics such as Economic Botany, Pollution, Green Chemistry, Environmental Economics, Green Marketing, Environmental Biology, Wildlife Biology, Applied Zoology and Toxicology are given importance in all the programmes of study. Students are encouraged to take up project work on environment related topics such as e-records, nuclear energy/nuclear reactor, teratogens and their effects on the unborn. A number of activities leading to composition of nature poems and essays that reflect the beauty of nature and the consequences of destruction of nature have been organised. One act plays have highlighted the benefits of water harvesting and importance of agriculture in a common man's life.

Every department contributes in its own way in upholding environment consciousness. For example, the Kannada text book *Parisarada Kathegalu* (stories of environment) and assignments on the theme - *Parisara* (environment) are concrete steps towards building an eco-friendly culture. Nature Club of the college works with the motto 'Nurture Nature' and brings out *Nisarga* – a compilation of articles dedicated to environmental issues.

1.1.2 Describe the mechanism used in the design and development of the curriculum. Give details on the process. (Need Assessment, Feedback, etc)

The introduction of a new curriculum requires an assessment to ascertain the benefits for the student body. In view of this, an assessment is made of the course content, availability of trained personnel/organizations for internship and job prospects.

A three-tier system is functional in the design and development of the curriculum:

- The curriculum is designed and developed by consulting Subject Experts/Industrialists/Alumni and by referring to the curricula of National and International Universities giving special consideration for higher education, employability and social responsibility.
- The departments hold BOS meetings and finalize the syllabus with an input from external experts.
- After the suggestions have been incorporated, the Academic Deans further scrutinize the syllabus and place it before the Academic Council which in turn seeks the final approval from the Governing Body.

The curriculum is reviewed taking the feedback from the BOS, Students, Peers, Parents, Employers and the Alumni. The suggestions after the analysis are incorporated into the syllabi wherever feasible.

1.1.3 How does the College/Department involve industry, research bodies, and civil society in the curriculum design and development process? How did the Department benefit through the involvement of the stakeholders?

The BOS comprises representatives from the industry, research bodies and civil society. Their involvement offers rich inputs with regard to skill development, which is a thrust area in higher education as it increases employment opportunity. Revision and improvement in the course content take place with the involvement of industry representatives during BOS meetings and also on personal consultation. Suggestions of experts from industry and other institutions have been incorporated into the syllabi whenever necessary.

The alumni employed by industries and corporate sectors keep updating the institution on contemporary needs.

Experts from reputed research institutes and civil society are invited to various academic programmes as resource people, who provide information on relevant subject areas to be incorporated into the curriculum.

Internship, project works and industrial visits make students assimilate the functioning of small/medium/large scale industries and the corporate world.

1.1.4 How are the following aspects ensured through curriculum design and development?

*Employability

The curriculum is designed and developed with the understanding that along with subject knowledge, skills required for higher studies, career and challenges of life are imparted. All the departments have these twin goals of education in mind while chalking out the syllabi.

*Innovation

MCQ Online Test as part of the Continuous Internal Assessment system prepares students for future competitive examinations.

Internship, project work, paper presentations and publication of the result of the research work in refereed journals strengthen research potential.

Along with curricular aspects, students are trained in practical aspects such as door-to-door campaign, field/factory visit, industrial/educational tour, rural exposure, interaction with representatives of industry, paper presentation techniques using ICT modules, exhibitions and model making.

*Research

The curriculum includes topics on current research areas enabling the learner to undertake project work as an avenue leading to basic research. The college has been granted the Star College Scheme by DBT, New Delhi through which students of the Basic Sciences undertake research projects, paper presentations and publications thereby involving advanced learning and nurturing of scientific temperament. Research-oriented assignments, seminars, workshops and mini projects promote research culture.

Research-based projects by some departments hone the research skills of students.

1.1.5 How does College/Department ensure that the curriculum developed addresses the needs of society and has relevance to the regional/national developmental needs?

Science:

The curriculum includes courses on Horticulture and Nursery Management, Environmental Biology, Molecular Waste Management, Rain Water Harvesting. Plant Pathology, Medical/Water/Food/Industrial/Dairy/Soil Microbiology and Genetics to cater to the needs of society. The curriculum has relevance in areas such as herbal plants and products, preservation of and caring for the environment and climate change, advances in the molecular aspects of biology, water conservation, solid waste management, plant disease control methods, health and hygiene, potable water, healthy food, antibiotics, drugs, industrial, analytical and biological chemistry and contributes towards the alleviation of problems of society and thereby serves the nation as a whole. The students learn Communication Electronics and Nuclear Physics that help them in knowing and understanding the concept of changing trends in the field of communication, changes taking place in the nuclear field and their impact on the environment and pros/cons of nuclear radiation.

The students are trained in the field of IT to learn Java, RDBMS, .Net Technology and other Programming Languages that are widely used in the IT sector and Business Outsourcing Units worldwide. The project work helps students in team dynamics, positive thinking, precise planning, effective time management and objectivity.

Commerce and Management:

Topics such as Contemporary Banking, Finance, Entrepreneurship Development, Marketing, Advertising and Sales Management, Financial Management, Human Resource Management, Organization Development, Total Quality Management, e-Banking, Core Banking, Accounting Standards and Modes of entering into International Business, Understanding Self Help Groups, Micro Finance and Assessment of Taxable Income lead to employability and promotion of entrepreneurship.

Optimum utilization of local resources through entrepreneurial leadership imparts the skills of healthy sales promotion with due respect to ethics and culture of society. It guides the procedure of investment and working of financial markets, improves the quality of work life through better work place communication, interpersonal skills, team building and fair remuneration. It also inculcates the habit of thrift, investment and risk management through the use of modern instruments and provides accountants with knowledge on relevant accounting standards and technical expertise.

Humanities:

The course content of History covers the social, economic and political aspects of the nation/world. Its objectives are to enable students to learn the process of upliftment of the needy. It makes students aware of the need to sustain the economy and constitutional/civic rights.

The study of Economics includes papers such as Monetary Economics, International Trade, Business Economics and Public Finance. That gives students the knowhow to deal with e-banking, financial planning and price mechanism. The curriculum is relevant and leads to employability in areas

such as Banking, State and Central Planning Boards, Financial Institutions, NGOs and others. The study of demand/supply, poverty, environmental economics and government schemes exposes students to real world problems and inculcates in them the spirit of sharing.

The study of Political Science enlightens the young minds on the functioning of the State and the rights/duties of citizens and inculcates in them the spirit of nationalism. Students reflect on core issues such as social justice, secularism and democracy.

The course content of Psychology includes topics which lead to a better understanding of the self/others, sharpening of memory, employment of effective study methods, analysis of different domains of child development/abnormalities, handling problems of puberty and transferring the knowledge gained in classrooms to society. Internship and field work which are part of the PG course are taken up in schools, hospitals, anti-addiction centres and old age homes. Modules on academic skills and memory enhancement improve students' life skills. In Anti-addiction Centres students offer counselling services to motivate individuals to give up substance abuse.

The Secretarial Practice department caters to the need for efficient, hard working, committed, competent and skilled secretaries with a wide array of skills of drafting, stenography, computer programming, travel/ticketing, banking and investment. The wide adoption of Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) software by large and small enterprises alike in the present day, has given rise to a number of job opportunities in operating/managing the software and the data therein. Keeping in mind that an office is the nerve centre of every organization, the Office Practice and Management course has been revised to provide knowledge and the required skills for Accounting, Office Procedure, Management in general and Human Resource Management in particular, Corporate Governance, Business Taxation and drafting Office Correspondence. A paper on Entrepreneurship trains students to set up their own enterprise. Practical exposure to programme organization, assignment on contemporary/practical topics and presentation opportunities hone the soft skills of students.

Under the language courses, students are exposed to women's writings and literary pieces focusing on environment, human relations and behavioural problems. Topics on communal harmony, secularism and social justice help students become better citizens, having global concern, environmental consciousness and greater respect for vulnerable sections of society. Translation, public speaking, proficiency in language contribute towards improvement in communication skills and cater to the needs of industry and media sectors and train students to take up jobs as consultants in global/non-governmental organizations. Malayalam and French offered in the place of Hindi/Kannada as the second language have led to student diversity and global competency.

General Education:

The Interdisciplinary Board of Studies (IDBOS) is constituted for the functioning of the various foundation and mandatory courses which come

under its purview. The General Education curriculum aims at providing students with value-oriented education. The curriculum equips the students with the knowledge of the Indian Constitution, Human Rights, Environmental Studies, Human Resource Management, Women's Studies and Journalism.

Religion/Moral education/Value Education:

Every religion promotes certain values which are necessary to be learnt and understood by all. Religious and social harmony can be augmented with the study of different religions. Keeping in mind the fragile social framework of our society, the faculty has worked on an organised and planned curriculum with the understanding that a focus on inter-religious education would sow fertile seeds of peace, fraternity and love for the others among young students. A well-crafted text book authored by the faculty covers topics such as history of the College, Agnesian models, spirituality, religious leaders, inter-religious dialogues, women's empowerment, code of conduct, civic sense, ethics, etiquette, friendship, marriage, media and personality development.

The College develops its own curriculum under the autonomous set up. However, the college adheres to the guidelines laid down by the UGC and statutes of Mangalore University. The syllabus is revised at least once in three years by the Board of Studies and is placed before the Academic Council for approval.

The challenges of the curriculum has led to the formation of an outreach programme - *Agnes Towards Community* for all final year degree students enabling them to be socially conscious. The Value Education/Moral education classes ensure that the students going out of the portals of St. Agnes College carry with them positive work culture and ethics of the institution.

30 to 60 percent of the syllabus has undergone changes during the last four years.



- The college has invited eminent scholars as resource persons to conduct input sessions for the faculty with regard to the curriculum. The resource persons have discussed with the faculty the strengths/areas for improvement of the curriculum designed/developed/ implemented. Enrichment programmes by Dr. Bernard Sami, Prof. of History, Loyola College, Chennai, in 2011-12; Dr. C. D. Lethi, HOD, Zoology, Holy Cross College, Trichi, in 2012-13 and Prof. Dr. Aloysius Sequeira, Head, School of Management, NITK, Surathkal, in 2013-14 were held to guide the faculty.
- Feedback is collected from subject experts, university representatives and peers both formally and informally.
- Some departments have sought feedback from international faculty on their curriculum.
- Experts who are invited as resource persons to seminars/workshops/ conferences are requested to give their suggestions with regard to the curriculum.
- In order to facilitate the revision of curriculum, the external academic experts were consulted for reviewing the new syllabi framed by the respective BOS in the new curricular structure.

Every department endeavours to upgrade its curriculum based on the feedback and when some desirable changes cannot be brought in owing to various constraints, what is beneficial for students is offered as Add-on/Certificate Courses. Seminars/workshops conducted also focus on the feedback and try to incorporate suggestions through lateral co-curricular programmes.

Mechanism to get feedback from Subject experts: Feedback is collected from the subject experts who serve as BOS members and others shortlisted from the subject associations at the University level.

Mechanism to get feedback from Community: During PTA meetings/interactions/ extension activities.

The IQAC conducts annual input sessions on innovation in curriculum development. The institution keeps abreast of recent developments at national and global level and incorporates required changes in the curriculum to meet global needs. Regular interactions with the various stakeholders to collect feedback and to use it at the time of review/revision help in the quality sustenance and enhancement of the curriculum.

In the autonomous setup, an institution's endeavour should be to offer its students a curriculum that moulds them into well informed, competent, socially committed individuals who uphold the ideals of their alma mater. St. Agnes College which places spirituality and social responsibility on the highest rung of a student's academic life hopes to have generated committed citizens of the nation and the world.

CRITERION – IITEACHING – LEARNING AND EVALUATION

The excellence of an educational institution rests on the Teaching, Learning and Evaluation processes. What a teacher does in class is absorbed by young minds that sustain these images over the ages. A teacher must be vigilant every day lest she/he should lose a fine opportunity to improve her tomorrow. However, the onus does not remain only with the teacher. Learning, regardless of how it is defined, is ultimately the responsibility of the learner as well. Whether the learner has acquired enough maturity for the responsibility is tested by the evaluation process. Evaluation is the key aspect of education and evaluating the progress of students with objectivity, testing the three levels of cognitive learning is in fact a challenge that every institution has to rise up to. St. Agnes College has done its best in this regard.

The College has made considerable efforts to serve students of different backgrounds and abilities. Teaching techniques such as focussed group discussions, debates, projects, presentations, experiments and application of ICT resources are some of the methodologies adopted by teachers which enable the students to engage in higher orders of thinking and investigation. The college supports the continuous professional development of teachers and also evaluates their performance annually to maintain quality in teaching and learning.

2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

2.1.1 How does the College ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The College ensures publicity through -

Prospectus – A committee nominated by the Principal prepares the Prospectus and the application form. The Prospectus includes the curricular highlights and student support services.

Awareness Programmes – Special programmes are conducted for Pre-University students by individual departments as part of their extension activity and other programmes to generate awareness regarding the college curriculum, instil a thirst for higher levels of learning and enhance the quality/quantity of admissions.

Website – The prospectus and application form are uploaded on the college website. Application forms can be bought at the College Office. The website has detailed information about the course structure, extra-curricular activities, extension activities and evaluation details.

Mass Media – Publicity is given in the newspapers to attract non-local students and those from rural areas.

Publicity during programmes – A Documentary on the college is played during seminars / workshops / conferences organised by various departments.

Handouts – Handouts are prepared and sent to all the local colleges and a few other colleges in the neighbouring states.

On-campus publicity – A hoarding outside the gate, a banner at the entrance and displays on notice boards provide useful information to prospective applicants.

Alumni – The alumni act as the ambassadors of the college and help to attract students from far and wide.

Transparency – Admissions are done in accordance with the Government and University norms. Transparency in the admission process is ensured by constituting an Admission Committee comprising faculty across departments and fees are paid directly at the bank located on the campus.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the process of admission put in place for UG, PG and Ph.D. programmes by the College. Explain the criteria for admission (Ex. (i) merit, (ii) merit with entrance test, (iii) merit, entrance test and interview, (iv) common test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (v) others followed by the College?

As per the college admission policy a well planned and structured admission process ensures transparency for both UG/PG programmes. The procedure is detailed below:

- A help desk is set up at the entrance of the college office to provide necessary information related to admission and to help candidates fill the application form.
- Faculty-wise counters are put up for receiving applications.
- The process of conducting interviews and verification of documents is taken up by an oriented and trained Admission Committee.
- The meritorious/sports candidates are given preference.
- Counselling is offered by the Principal, the Vice-principal and the members of the Admission Committee before the students make their selection of the Programme.
- The admission procedure is computerised.
- An entrance examination is held for the PG Clinical Psychology Programme.
- Faculty-wise assemblies are organised for parents and their wards to inform them about the rules and regulations of the college, especially the rules regarding autonomy and what constitutes the ethics and code of conduct at St. Agnes College.

2.1.3 Does the College have a mechanism to review its admission process and student profiles annually? If yes, what is the outcome of such an analysis and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

The number and composition of the candidates applying for and admitted to the undergraduate programme is reviewed in the Academic Council meeting in July each year. Programmes which are in high demand are considered for self-financed additional sections. Two new sections in B.Com. have been added, as currently the Commerce stream is in high demand. In 2014, permission was granted by Mangalore University to increase the intake for M.Com. and M.Sc. in Chemistry from 40 to 60 and from 20 to 30 respectively.

- **2.1.4.** What are the strategies adopted to increase/improve access to students belonging to the following categories?
 - * SC/ST * OBC * Women * Different categories of persons with disabilities * Economically weaker sections * Outstanding achievers in sports and extracurricular activities

St. Agnes College is a minority institution giving preference to students from minority communities and is exclusively for women at the UG level. At the time of admission, students belonging to SC/ST/OBC/economically weaker sections/achievers in sports and ECA are shown preference and are informed about the various facilities/scholarships available to them.

The College has set up an Equal Opportunity Cell that gives encouragement to SC/ST/OBC students to attend courses and programmes that would enhance their personal effectiveness. The students of these categories are given additional books and services in the library. Providing scribes to the visually impaired students, making arrangements in the ground floor of the library for the disabled and having special scholarships for them are some of the measures taken by the college to encourage students with physical disabilities. The college has ramps at two places. The college provides Management and Endowed Scholarships for students from economically disadvantaged backgrounds. Midday meal is provided for the needy students. Sports achievers are encouraged and given spot admissions. Shortage in attendance is condoned for the deserving as per the University regulation after ensuring that the reasons are valid. Keeping the fitness of the sports students in mind, the college provides wholesome breakfast at the time of regular training. Since the college is exclusively for women at the UG level, it attracts students from minority communities. The college also provides fee concession to the deserving students.

The BSW and Biotechnology Programmes have been discontinued since 2013-14 because the applicants were very few and conducting the Programme was not viable.

YES. The college has a number of programmes for freshers.

Orientation for Freshers:

The College organises an assembly for freshers and their parents/guardians at the beginning of the academic year. All the interactions are bilingual keeping in mind the inclusiveness factor among a widely heterogeneous composition of parents and students. The matter highlighted in the orientation programme includes:

- Vision and Mission of the institution
- Academic planning and calendar of events
- Core values and ethos of the college
- Code of conduct for students
- Attendance requirements
- Leave procedures
- Student support services
- Sexual Harassment cum Grievance Redressal Cell/Anti-Ragging Cell
- Fee payment regulations
- Extra-curricular activities
- Autonomous functioning of the College
- Information on Credits and Grade Points
- Evaluation Pattern
- Principal's Roll of Honour, Award of Merit Certificate and other recognitions
- Career Guidance and Campus Placement
- Paying Guest Accommodation

Experts from academia, industry, well-placed alumni and senior students are involved in the orientation and induction programme.

- The reopening day commences with the Eucharistic Celebrations for the Catholic students followed by general assembly for all students.
- During the assembly for freshers, Principal briefs the students about the rules and regulations of the College, a motivating message is given by a faculty, experiences of the college life are shared by an alumnus and the newly elected Student Council introduce themselves to the assembly.
- A group of senior students guide the first year students and acquaint them with the facilities on the campus and other important aspects of the

College. Every stream submits a report on the programme to the Vice-principal for documentation.


• The Librarian addresses the students in the classrooms during the value education hour and later the students are introduced to various sections, services and facilities in the library.

In addition to subject specific orientation, the PG students also have an orientation programme which highlights the importance of higher studies/ evaluation methods/ skills to be acquired during the programme, assistance provided to the advanced/slow learners and research papers to be presented.

2.2.2 Does the college have a mechanism through which the differential requirements of student population are analysed after admission and before the commencement of the classes? If so, how are the key issues identified and addressed?

YES.

- The Student Welfare Officer and the Counselling Centre identify the differential requirements of the student population with the help of the value-education teachers/mentors and attempt to resolve the issues or provide necessary facilities to the needy students.
- The differential requirements of the students are analysed on the basis of the past experiences, biographical profiles and other specific requests.
- The students are guided during the orientation programme in the beginning of the year with regard to the EC/CC activity, ID card procedure, fee payment, scholarship, mid-day meal scheme, library facilities, bus/railway pass and hostel facility.
- Students with language problems are identified and encouraged to join the UGC sponsored Communicative English Certificate Course.
- Information about counselling & health care services is provided regularly.



2.2.3 Does the College provide bridge /Remedial /add-on courses? If yes, how are they structured into the time table? Give details of the courses offered, department-wise/faculty-wise?

YES. The College provides Remedial/Add-on courses which are structured into the time table.

Some departments organise bridge courses to help students cope with the demands of the syllabi. The **Language Laboratory** of the English Department looks after the needs of the students whose communication skills in English are weak. It is also used by the students of the Communicative English course to enhance their vocabulary and grammar. **Remedial Classes** are conducted by the departments after identifying the slow learners, based on their performance in the mid-semester exam/unit test. Departments prepare a time table for these students and a record of remedial classes is maintained at the department level. The performance of students is regularly monitored by the Department. Other **Enrichment Programmes** such as theory club, soft skills and personality development are conducted for the benefit of students to enhance communication and theatre skills.

2.2.4 Has the College conducted a study on the incremental academic growth of different categories of students; - students from disadvantaged sections of society, economically disadvantaged, physically challenged and slow learners etc.? If yes, give details on how the study has helped the College to improve the performance of these students.

YES. The academic performance of the economically disadvantaged, physically challenged and slow learners is constantly monitored.

- The English department identifies slow learners and helps them by translating English texts into the vernacular language for better understanding. The department also utilizes the services of the advanced learners as tutors in training the slow learners.
- Counselling and personal assistance is given to the economically disadvantaged, physically challenged and slow learners in the Psychology department.
- Professional counselling services are offered by the Career Guidance and Placement Cell.
- Counselling services are offered by Carmel Counselling Centre (UG) and Navachetana Wellness Centre (PG).

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to the learning needs of advanced learners?

Advanced learners are identified based on the academic progress records, faculty interaction and participation in the academic and non-academic activities of the college.

- Advanced learners are encouraged to participate in seminars, conferences and present papers, both within and outside the college. In the past four years 36 UG students and 163 PG students presented papers in national and international conferences/seminars. The talents of the advanced learners are used in the organisation of programmes. In all departments advanced learners are motivated to help slow learners and in the process they become more proficient in the subject.
- Books and topics are given for further reading.
- The department of Computer Application gives additional lab work to solve problems using alternative methods and programs, and queries are given to improve analytical and logical skills.
- The Computer Science Department organises Software project development using VB.NET.
- Commerce students are trained in soft skills for professional competence and take up project work for practical exposure of the subjects learnt. The department utilises the talents of the advanced learners to train the students of neighbouring government colleges in soft skills.
- Science Departments organise visits to research labs, participation in Science Day programmes and other activities to inculcate scientific temper. The advanced learners act as tutors in the Sunday Science School Programme of the Chemistry Department.
- The English Department utilises the advanced learners in the Language Labs as facilitators, honing their communication and leadership ability.

The department appoints a third BA English Major Student as student editor of the College Magazine and also selects a group of advanced learners to design the photo pages for the same. The department had a group study exchange programme with the School of Social Work, Roshni Nilaya.

- Students of English and Secretarial Practice Departments had *Each One Teach One Programme* in which the students of a local government college were taught internet browsing skills.
- The department of Economics organises 'Each One Teach One' sessions to help slow learners.
- The M.Com. students visit the neighbouring Pre-university colleges as facilitators.
- The M.Sc. students are trained to write proposals for Summer Internship Programme at prestigious institutes like IIT Mumbai, IIT Madras, NCL Pune, NITK Surathkal and CPCRI Kasargod.
- Peer teaching is undertaken by students of M.A. English, the thrust areas being the teaching of English language/linguistics, Photoshop and Microsoft Publisher. Advanced learners were given special coaching to prepare them for their one month summer internship at Gyan Adab, Pune.
- Annual Best Reader Award has been instituted by the library.

2.2.6 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The College has taken measures to support differently-abled students:

- The College has two ramps at strategic points.
- Instead of writing assignments, the option of seminar presentation was offered by the Economics Department.
- The college provides a scribe to the differently abled for writing exams and extra time is given to complete the paper.
- Special scholarships are instituted.
- Special provisions are made in the library for the differently-abled students.
- Seating arrangements on the ground floor are provided in the classrooms and examination hall.

2.3 Teaching Learning Process

Diversity of Learners with respect to their background, abilities and other personal attributes will influence the extent of their learning. The teaching-learning modalities of the institution are made relevant for the learner group. The learner-centred education through appropriate methodologies facilitates effective learning. Teachers provide a variety of learning experiences, including individual and collaborative learning. The teachers employ an interactive and participatory approach, to create a feeling of responsibility in learning and thus make learning a process of construction of knowledge.

- **2.3.1** How does the college plan and organise the teaching learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan and evaluation blue print, etc.)
- The Academic Calendar is prepared before the commencement of the academic year in consultation with the Principal, the Vice Principal, the Deans and the Controller of Examinations and includes the schedule of teaching, learning and evaluation.
- The College Calendar carries information about the Continuous Internal Assessment, Mid-term/ End-semester examinations, ECA and Co-curricular activities and the working days, inclusive of the last working day.
- The syllabus copy, regular announcements on the notice board, website and public address system provide necessary information on teaching-learning-evaluation schedule to the students.
- The teacher-student ratio is very effective in Basic Science and Humanities. In addition to traditional teaching methods, use of slide presentations, seminar method and other innovative methods including ICT modules have been followed. As the number of students is large under Commerce and Management Courses, many rooms are provided with LCD monitors facilitating the use of power point presentations.
- The teaching-learning schedules are prescribed by the respective BOS of the department concerned.
- Question bank, model question papers and reference books are provided to the students.
- The work diary maintained by each teacher, records the unitized syllabus, teaching plan and goals accomplished and schedules adhered to. The work diaries are regularly monitored. Once a month, the diaries are to be submitted to the HOD for attestation and at the end of the semester to the Principal.
- Teaching learning modules are organised by dividing big numbers into manageable batches, use of ICT modules, tutorials and mentoring.

2.3.2 Does the college provide course outlines and course schedule prior to the commencement of the academic session? If yes, how is the effectiveness of the process ensured?

YES.

- Course outlines are provided through the prospectus. Inputs on course structure/syllabus are announced on the College Website at the time of admission.
- Course structure and Unitised syllabus are made available at the office of the Controller of Examinations and every department at the beginning of the academic year.
- The college calendar contains information about the regulations and the course requirements.

- Students are given orientation by the respective subject teachers, so that students have enough knowledge about the course content, regulations and examination system.
- 2.3.3 What are the courses, which predominantly follow the lecture method? Apart from classroom interactions, what are the other methods of learning experiences provided to students?

In addition to the lecture method, ICT facilities are used for enhancing the effectiveness of teaching. Other methods of providing learning experiences include:

- Demonstration, Research Projects, Brainstorming, Student Paper Presentation, Quiz, Interaction with the Panel of Experts, Group Discussions, Case Study, Internships, Role Plays, Assignments, Field Study, Industrial Tour, Debate, Survey, Preparation of Posters and others.
- Learner-centred methods such as lectures with discussions and inquiry-based approaches
- Seminars/workshops at different levels to enhance leadership/learning skills
- Learning experiences provided through regular EC/CC activities conducted by the various associations and cells
- Agnes Towards Community an extension programme on social responsibility for the final year students
- Honing of writing skills through publication in newsletter, college magazine and journals
- Educational tours another form of learning experience provided to students

2.3.4 How learning is made more student-centric? Give a list of participatory learning activities adopted by the faculty that contribute to holistic development and improved student learning, besides facilitating lifelong learning and knowledge management.

Learning is made more student-centric through participatory activities such as:

- Participatory learning activities for self management, knowledge development and skill formation
- Individual activities such as project work, student seminars, case studies and internship
- Group activities such as peer group teaching, seminars, workshops, exhibitions, academic competitions, guest lectures, role plays, brain storming sessions, field surveys, Intercollegiate fests Agnofest/Avishkar, Agnes Towards Community and NAVIDAD a fund raiser for the homeless
- Opportunities to contribute articles to the college magazine and newsletter
- Assignments that involve collecting and presenting information encourage independent thinking
- Importance for character building through Value Education and Moral education classes
- Participation in add-on courses, EC and CC activities enabling life skills

- Library resource for better knowledge management through INFLIBNET/ RGUHS membership
- Gallery walk and other forms of peer teaching
- Model Making, Quiz, Newspaper Reading, Participation in Symposia, Seminars and Conferences, Interdepartmental Activities, Paper Presentations and Exhibitions.

2.3.5 What is the college policy on inviting experts/people of eminence to provide lectures/seminars for students?

Every department conducts at least one seminar/workshop in a semester. The head of the department/coordinator of the programme invites experts in the respective fields. The honorarium to the speakers/experts is paid by the college as per the guidelines of the UGC. For the National/State level seminars/workshops eminent resource persons from reputed industries and institutions are invited.

2.3.6 What are the latest technologies and facilities used by the faculty for effective teaching?



2.3.7 Is there a provision for the services of counsellors/mentors/ advisors for each class or group of students for academic, personal and psycho-socio guidance? If yes, give details of the process and no. of students who have benefited.

YES. The college has an effective system of guiding students at different levels through:

- Academic counselling which is done by the subject teacher/mentor/dean/Vice-principal.
- In academic counselling, slow learners are identified based on their previous exam records and are given remedial coaching through tutorials/ tests/ assignments to improve their performance.
- Students who are academically proficient are given counselling to pursue coaching for competitive examinations and research. Capable students are identified and counselled to write research projects and apply for summer research fellowship.
- Value Education/Moral education teachers are of assistance in personal/family/emotional/peer issues of concern.

- Some of the staff members are trained counsellors who offer counselling services to the needy students. When teachers are not trained counsellors, they identify the need for counselling and send such students to the trained counsellors.
- Students are provided with the services of two campus counsellors who
 interact with the students every week through Carmel Counselling Centre and
 Navchethana Wellness Centre. The Centre offers a PG Diploma Course in
 Guidance and Counselling.
 - 2.3.8 Are there any innovative teaching approaches/methods/ practices adopted/ put to use by the faculty during the last four years? If yes, did they improve the learning? Activities that foster creativity to develop inherent intelligence make learning enjoyable. Likewise, it is scientific temper that makes students view ideas objectively and turn education into an enriching experience.

• Student projects, interdisciplinary research projects, paper presentations, PPTs, assignments, exhibitions, wall magazines, bulletin boards, add-on courses, CC/EC activities, fests are opportunities for nurturing creativity, innovation and scientific temper among students.

- Computer Club, VISTA Club, IT dumb charades further enhance creativity.
- Magazine Cover Page & Photo Page Designing, Street Plays, Slogan Writing, Designing Logos, Field Work and Documentation tap the creative impulse of students.
- Preparation of teaching materials includes Mathematical models, Origami and animation to instil creativity.

2.3.10 Does the college consider student projects a mandatory part of the learning program? If so for how many programs are they made mandatory?

YES. Project work is mandatory for BCA, M.Com. and M.Sc. Psychology. PG English has introduced a research term paper and Viva Voce for Final Year M.A. students. UG Departments of Microbiology, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Commerce, Psychology and BBM have introduced projects as part of the final year curriculum.

The faculty members guide the students in their projects. They help students in associating with industries of repute.

2.3.11 What efforts are made to facilitate the faculty in learning/handling computer-aided teaching/learning materials? What are the facilities available in the college for such efforts?

Computer literacy is one of the main criteria while recruiting teachers. Computers have been provided in all departments. Laptops are also provided to a few departments at the UG level and to all the departments at the PG level. All the PG classrooms also have LCD and Internet facilities have been provided with printer and scanner. Teachers are motivated in learning/executing computer aided teaching methodology. In-house training is given to teachers in the use of computer technology by the departments of Computer Science/Computer Application and external experts. Training was given to use interactive board by its vendor. A video recording studio, WiFi, an audiovisual room are the other facilities available in the college.

2.3.12 Does the college have a mechanism for evaluation of teachers by the students/alumni? If yes, how is the evaluation used in achieving qualitative improvement in the teaching learning process.

YES. Students are given a structured questionnaire to evaluate teachers every academic year. In 2014-15, an online questionnaire was developed using GOOGLE form. The data was collected from the majority of students and was analysed and presented in the form of graphs. The identity of the students was kept confidential.

Feedback on areas where improvement is required is given to the particular teachers by the Principal. The teachers incorporate suggestions given by the students and the authorities concerned.

Various departments also call for feedback on different aspects of teaching and learning.

2.3.13 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If yes elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

No. The institution does not face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame as the time schedule is strictly adhered to.

- After the college became autonomous, the duration of both odd and even semesters is for a period of 16 weeks.
- Teaching plans are organised at the department level.
- Syllabi are framed by the BOS accordingly.
- The Teacher's Diary is maintained and the unitization of the syllabus is done to systematise the teaching process.

2.3.14 How are library resources used to augment teaching-learning process?

Adequate facilities have been created in the main library to augment the teaching-learning process. Book exhibitions are organised to facilitate the faculty members and students to select books of their choice. Books for competitive exams are issued to both staff and students. Use of such books enables both students and staff to acquire knowledge in their respective fields. Best Reader Award is given a student to promote library usage. "Book Digest: The Buzz about Books" is a unique programme that has been started by the library to enhance reading habit among students. Library facilities have been extended through online journals and e-library. These help students in collecting research data. Training programmes have enhanced the ability of both staff and students in the usage of e- resources.

Various Science Department libraries have been upgraded through the Star College Scheme.

2.3.15 How does the institution continuously monitor and report on the quality of teaching, teaching methods used, classroom environments and the effect on the student performance?

The reputation of the college is built on the attributes of quality teaching, learning, and evaluation which are based on discipline and effective follow up methods. Therefore, care is taken to ensure that appropriate systems have been introduced at different levels:

- Teacher quality is evaluated by the students in the regular feedback process.
- Regular departmental meetings are held to discuss pertinent issues and follow up action is taken.
- Review meetings are held at the faculty level at the end of every academic year.
- Student discipline is continuously monitored through the Discipline Committee/HOD/Dean.
- Student performance is assessed regularly through progress reports generated. A follow up of students' performance is done through parent-teacher meet.
- Students are counselled and are given remedial classes if the performance is below expectation.
- Motivational talks are organised.

- Senior teachers in the department help the new recruits by sharing their experience and guiding them, and thereby developing their confidence and potential.
- At the closure of the academic year, teachers go through self-appraisal to check whether they have adhered to the standards and realized the goals.
- The Internal Quality Assurance Cell checks the working of each department during the dry-run and gives written suggestions so that lapses can be taken care of in the coming year.
- The Quality Circles monitor the various programmes, disciplinary matters and infrastructural facilities.
- Every department submits annually the departmental profile which records the activities of the year and the plan of action for the ensuing year.

- Teaching ability and communication skills are tested through Personal Interview, Demo Teaching and Group Discussion.
- Knowledge level of the candidate is examined. Commitment to teaching is ascertained in the interview by the experts by raising pertinent questions that bring to the forefront the candidates' attitude towards teaching profession.


- There is a research policy which encourages teachers to take up research studies. Seed money for research is sanctioned by the management for teachers who do not receive grants from the UGC and other bodies.

- The college offers the incentive of reimbursing the registration amount.

- Information about the seminars/conferences attended is published in the annual report of the college.
- Regular in-service training programmes are organised.

Training in ICT is given to the staff members. They are deputed for short term courses organised by the College Development Council (CDC) of the University.

2.4.13 What are the teaching innovations made during the last five years? How are innovations rewarded?

Autonomy has provided a great opportunity to be innovative in teaching and learning. In fact, the primary objective of seeking autonomous status is to rejuvenate the process of teaching and learning. The examination oriented teaching method has now given way to interactive and experiential learning. Teaching has been re-designed to be in tune with the continuous assessment system. A few innovations are mentioned below:

- Learner-participatory-teaching method: Paper presentations, classroom discussions and interactions have been included in classroom learning.
- Projects have been taken up for the students even at the undergraduate level facilitating interactive teaching/learning.
- E-learning methods: IT methods are commonly used.
- Online MCQs are conducted for all the students

- Laboratories have been equipped/upgraded with highly sophisticated instruments under the Star College Scheme.
- Through financial assistance under Star College Scheme, department libraries have been upgraded and faculty has been trained in special experimental techniques.
- Interdisciplinary projects and research paper presentations have been taken up.
- Sample and data collection through survey has facilitated teaching and experiential learning.

In the annual audit by the IQAC and in the meetings of the Academic Council, innovative methods used by teachers are assessed.

2.4.14 Does the college have the mechanism to encourage -

• mobility of faculty between institutions for teaching?

YES. There is a provision for knowledge sharing among the faculty of different institutions.

Time table is drafted keeping the convenience of the part time teachers in mind.

The college revoked its day-order system to facilitate the redeployed teachers to take their classes.

Our teachers are invited as resource persons and guest faculty in some courses; similarly experts from other institutions have been invited to the college as resource persons

The PG Department of English has collaborated with St. Aloysius College, Mangaluru for faculty exchange programme. Such exchange of faculty will expand the horizon of knowledge, create awareness about new developments in literature, help in updating the curriculum and provide exposure to the students and staff leading to knowledge enhancement.

2.5 Evaluation process and reforms

2.5.1 How does the college ensure that all the stakeholders are aware of the evaluation processes that are operative?

The evaluation process is one of the important components in autonomy. Students, parents and all the stakeholders are well informed. Awareness is created through the following:

- The college calendar provides information on the rules and regulations pertaining to examinations and merit.
- Necessary information/and instructions are given to the students through the general assembly/ faculty-wise orientation programmes/Public Address System/notice board. The College Website updates information regarding results and provisional marks cards.
- The departments and Controller of Examinations maintain a copy of the syllabus and end semester question papers along with scheme of valuation.

- The newly recruited staff members are oriented at the beginning of the year on the evaluation process.
- At the Annual Meetings with parents, instructions are given. Result Programmes and open house meetings with parents are organised.
- 2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms initiated by the college and to what extent have they been implemented in the college? Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the evaluation management system?
- An Examination Committee has been constituted. Semester results are declared based on SGPA and Programme result on CGPA.
- During the year 2015-16, the credit pattern was changed from 120 to 100 credits as per the guidelines of Mangalore University.
- The evaluation is external 70% of the scripts valued by external examiners and 30% by the internal examiners. 10% of the scripts valued by the external examiners are reviewed by the Chief Examiner. Papers are then sent for third valuation if a difference of more than 10% is found.
- Multiple Choice Questions are included for CIA of all the courses. On-line MCQ tests were introduced in 2014-15.
- Co-curricular and Extra-curricular activities are assessed for one credit each in the first four semesters of the UG programme.
- Students are given the opportunity of re-totalling, personal seeing, revaluation and rejection of results.
- A Flying Squad is appointed to supervise the process of mid semester and end semester examination
- University Registration number and the candidates photograph are included in the marks card
- At the PG level, there are two valuations of the end semester examination answer scripts by the internal and external examiners.
- The End Semester examination answer booklets contain the watermark of the College Logo.
- Photograph of the candidates and hologram are affixed in the marks card.
 Marks Cards contain security features.
- Marks are allotted for Class Record.
- Online Certificate Verification System (http://www.stagnescollege.org/certiveri) was introduced in 2014 in association with Global Document Verification System.

It has been observed that the students improve their performance gradually from semester to semester. Overall results have been good.

2.5.7 Does the college have an integrated examination platform for the following processes?

YES. The college has a comprehensive examination process carefully planned and executed.

Pre-examination processes:

- The college calendar, regular announcements (PAS), notice board, college website and the software developed for the examination system take care of the pre-examination process.
- A schedule is followed with regard to the process of Board of Appointment of Examiners (BOAE), Board of Examiners (BOE) for theory and practicums, examination time table, application forms, examination rolls, admission cards, proof reading of the question paper and printing.
- A flying squad is constituted at the beginning of each end-semester examination.
- Answer books, stationery and other logistics support for examination are taken care of well in advance.
- The principal selects the question papers randomly, printing is done in the security area and the printed question papers are sealed in the presence of the Controller of Examinations.

Examination Process:

- The Office of the Controller of Examinations monitors the examination process. An office with adequate manpower and technology has been provided to discharge the responsibilities efficiently and effectively.
- The Chief Superintendent and Office Superintendents are overall in-charge of the examination process.
- The Flying Squad monitors examination irregularities, if any.

• The office processes the answer books, manages attendance and preserves the answer books systematically in the Strong Room.

Post-examination process:

- A custodian is appointed with sufficient manpower to manage the central valuation system.
- The chairpersons of Boards of Studies appoint the Chief/Assistant Examiners.
- Appointment letters are sent to external examiners as per the approved list.
- The issue and return of answer books are monitored by the custodian.
- Central valuation ensures safety and sanctity of the examination.
- Records are maintained systematically at every stage.
- Entries are transferred from the A form to the examination software as and when the valuation is completed.
- Payment to external examiners is done on the spot and internal examiners are paid after the declaration of results.
- Two teams of tabulators are appointed. The tabulators scrutinise and verify the entries made. After verifying the entries, the tabulators scrutinise results, award grace marks wherever permitted.
- Provisional Marks Cards and Provisional Pass Certificates are issued immediately after the announcement of results, if required.
- Marks cards are printed and issued to students subsequently.
- Students are provided the opportunity of applying for personal seeing, retotalling, revaluation and rejection of results. A notification to this effect is displayed on the notice board.
- Revaluation results are declared within one month from the last date prescribed for applying.
- Marks Registers are prepared and submitted to Mangalore University for issuing the Degree Certificate.

2.5.8 Has the college introduced any reforms in its Ph.D. evaluation process?

The PG Centre of the college has been recently recognized as a Research Centre by Mangalore University & is yet to begin with the Ph.D. programme.

- 2.5.9 What efforts are made by the college to streamline the operations at the office of the Controller of Examinations? Mention any significant efforts which have improved the process and functioning of the examination division/section?
- Controller of Examinations with adequate staff has been appointed to handle the workload.
- Examination section has been equipped with a Controller's cabin, a counter for the technical staff, a separate room for confidential work and a Strong Room to preserve the answer scripts.

- The examination office has been provided with required infrastructural facilities computers, printers, scanners, photo-copiers and lockers.
- Examination software has been built-up and is well managed.
- Incorporation of greater security measures with regard to question paper printing, proof reading and marks cards to avoid tampering and storage with high security have been taken care of.
- The Examination Section has been re-located for easy access.

2.5.10 What is the mechanism for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation?

- Students are provided with the opportunity of applying for personal seeing, re-totalling, revaluation and rejection of results to improve their performance. A notification to this effect is displayed on the notice board.
- The revaluation is done by external examiners if the papers are valued by internal examiners and vice versa.
- Double valuation is done in postgraduate courses. The students are also provided with the facility of challenge valuation. In such cases, the challenged valuation is done by the Board consisting of the Chairperson, an external examiner and an internal examiner who have not valued the paper before.

YES. The college has clearly stated learning outcomes for its programmes and these are printed in the college calendar.

- Assessment of CC/EC activities
- Feedback from all stakeholders

The emphasis of the institution is learner-centred teaching. Learning outcomes of the students are analysed on the basis of:

- Student performance in the end semester examinations

- Participation in extension activities
- Feedback from employers, parents and other stakeholders, examiners and co-partners.

The issues identified are discussed at different levels:

- Student feedback

Critical thinking by decision makers at different levels helps in identifying areas for improvement, for systems to be introduced and for facilities to be offered.

3.2.6 How many departments of the College have been recognized for their research activities by national/international agencies (UGC-SAP, CAS, DST-FIST; DBT, ICSSR, ICHR, ICPR, etc.) and what is the quantum of assistance received? Mention any two significant outcomes or breakthrough due to such recognition.

The Department of Biotechnology (DBT), Ministry of Science & Technology, Government of India supported with financial assistance of Rupees 55 Lakhs to five Basic Science departments - Botany, Chemistry, Physics, Zoology and Microbiology of the College under the Star College Scheme from 2012 to 2015. The scheme enabled the students of Basic Science departments to carry out interdisciplinary projects. In recognition of the outstanding progress made by the students, the DBT has continued its financial assistance for 2 more years (2015-2017) and has sanctioned Rupees 22 Lakhs. Additional 1 lakh was sanctioned to conduct scientific competitions.

Significant outcomes

- The DBT has provided an opportunity for students to take up Projects/Paper presentations/National Lab visits/Industry visits and students have received best research paper presentation awards at national conferences. The interest of students to pursue higher education/career in science has been augmented.
- Laboratories have been upgraded with latest equipment. The faculty and students have taken training programmes at various institutes and improved their hands on experimental skills.



3.6.2 How does the College promote College-neighborhood network and student engagement, contributing to holistic development of students and sustained community development?

The College has made significant contributions under extension activities involving the faculty and student volunteers in collaboration with organisations/schools/public. Several awareness programmes on health and hygiene, importance of blood donation, human rights, and visits to orphanages, old age homes, hospitals, special schools have been arranged which contribute to the holistic development of students as they are sensitised to the needs of society. The five Science Departments under STAR College

Scheme, DBT, have given hands-on training to faculty and students of other university affiliated colleges to conduct experiments.

Some of the college initiated programmes are:

Agnes Towards Community (ATC)

ATC was launched by the college in 2014 with a focus on awareness, education and service. The students are involved in community service in collaboration with local NGOs – PADI and CODP to sensitise the young minds towards community and its problems. The aim is also to create awareness on social issues so as to build a humane society. The programmes organised are:

- Child Line Awareness: 'Child-line 1098 Awareness Programme' was organized in collaboration with PADI at 15 circles of Mangaluru to educate the public on child abuse and child labour. A rally was organised and pamphlets were distributed for dissemination of information.
- Awareness Programmes on Safety of Girls: A training programme on girl-child safety titled 'Project Angel' in association with *Inchara Foundation* was arranged for primary school children. Awareness programmes on girl child abuse and evils of social media were organised in 15 high schools of Mangaluru in association with PADI.
- Interaction with Ms. Sampath Pal, a National Social Activist of Gulabi Gang: An interactive session on issues of women abuse, domestic violence, sexual harassment and women illiteracy was held with Ms. Sampath Pal.
- Programme on life experiences with Harekala Hajabba and Shridhar Gowda, regional social activists: Harekala Hajabba, on whom Zee TV conferred the Real Hero Award in recognition of his endeavour of starting a school irrespective of being a poor illiterate orange seller, in a backward village, inspired the students by his exemplary life.
 Shridhar Gowda, a social activist and victim of Endosulphan, shared his experiences about the hazards caused by Endosulphan and sensitised students to help the victims of Endosulphan.
- Awareness programmes: The college students organized an awareness programme on child abuse, female foeticide and child trafficking for the students of Ramakrishna English Primary School, Mangaluru. Programmes were organized on health, hygiene and cleanliness for the students of the local primary schools of Mangaluru.
- Visits to orphanages/ashrams/old age homes/rehabilitation centres: Students in 15 groups visited 15 centres in and around Mangaluru, organized programmes and distributed eatables, sanitary items and clothes.
- Cleanliness Drive: A cleanliness drive was carried out at 15 locations of Mangaluru as part of *Swachh Bharath Project*.
- Government Scheme Campaign: Students visited four villages and educated the villagers on various government schemes.
- Survey of the local village: Students conducted a survey on the standard of living of the inhabitants of a village in Bajpe, an adopted village of CODP, with which the College has collaborated.
- Exercising franchise: Students conducted door to door campaign in different villages and motivated the villagers to exercise their franchise SSR, St. Agnes College (Autonomous), Mangaluru 102

and also to attend Gram Panchayat meetings regularly. As a result there was a marked improved in the enrolment for franchise.

Other programmes organised:

- **Rural Exposure:** PG students have rural exposure at villages as part of their community development programmes.
- **Peace Day Celebration:** Peace day is celebrated with an emphasis on communal harmony and national integration.
- Visits to Endosulphan affected village: Faculty and students visited Kokkada, an endosulphan affected village and contributed a wheelchair to one of the endosulphan victims. In addition, a house is being constructed.
- St. Agnes Women's Centre Sumangala: Computer literacy, Culinary skills and Fashion designing programmes are organised by the centre for the needy women and school/college dropouts. Counselling is offered to women and children when necessary. The Centre animates two Self Help Groups Spoorthi and Deepa, with 20 members each, and motivates the members to attend various skill development programmes organised by the District Small Scale Industries Centre at Yeyyadi. The Centre aims at SHG development and extends its support in planning/training/executing the entrepreneurship development schemes. Further, it helps members to apply for various Government schemes and bank loans.
- Annual Christmas Charity Show *Navidad*: The amount collected from the sale of tickets and the proceedings of the Garage Sale are given to a student/support staff of the college to provide shelter.
- **Student Cabinet:** The Secretaries of various Associations/Clubs/Cells organize outreach/service activities by visiting the orphanages/old age homes/rehabilitation centres/differently abled schools.
- Nurture Nature in the Neighbourhood: Students planted 120 Oleander plants at the road median in front of the college gate in the presence of *Salu Marada* Thimmakka, a 105 year old renowned environmentalist.

- Pre-medical camp surveys, medical camps, health/hygiene awareness programmes and socio-economic surveys in the villages where the annual camps are held
- Celebration of World Environment Day, intercollegiate shramadhan programme, rally at Mangalore University campus
- Vanamahotsava in association with the Forest Department/Lions Club
- Participation in *Laksha Vriksha Abhiyana* organised by the Mangalore City Corporation
- Regular participation in Swachha Bharath Abhiyan

- AIDS awareness programmes in association with Red Ribbon Club and KSAPS
- Celebration of Christmas at orphanages/homes for the aged
- *Magu Neenu Nagu* programme organised for the students of primary/high schools of neighbourhood
- Awareness on fire disasters and training in Fire Safety measures
- Organization of medical camps at villages where NSS camps are held
- *Vasthra Abhiyana* collection and distribution of clothes to the patients of the Government Hospital, Mangaluru
- Assistance in blood donation camps in the college
- Organisation of regional/state level workshops

NCC: The NCC unit has the Air wing and the Army wing. Cadets attend regular weekly parades. They are also involved in service activities such as:

- Participation in Kargil Vijay Divas
- Rally against atrocities against women
- Participation in international yoga day celebrations
- Beach cleaning a cleanliness drive
- Visits to orphanages/old age homes/destitute homes
- Assistance in blood donation camps in the college
- Assistance in maintaining discipline during formal programmes
- Guard of Honour on important occasions

YRC and AIDS Awareness Education Cell

- Regular annual blood donation camp in association with Fr. Muller Medical College Hospital/Lions Club/United Friends Club/JCI, Mangaluru
- Observation of the World AIDS Day, Visits to Snehasadan a rehabilitation centre for HIV positive individuals.

Rangers and Traffic Ward Squad

- Participation in the Greenathon Rally to create awareness on environmental issues
- Visits to homes for the aged/orphanages
- Participation in the Road Safety Patrol organised by the Mangalore City Traffic Police
- Service in regulating traffic at four junctions during peak hours

Visits to families of endosulphan victims

A group of students along with the faculty visited the families of endosulphan victims at Kokkada, 80 kms. away from Mangaluru. The plight of the victims had such an impact on the students that they immediately raised funds and donated a wheel chair to a child victim. After conducting the survey of the situation of the village, the college decided to construct a house for an endosulphan victim's family. In addition, out of the contributions of *Agno Ashray Fete*, two more houses are being constructed for two families in the same village.

To understand the socio-economic life of the people of rural areas, students have conducted a survey at Bajpe, which is 40 kms from Mangaluru.

The college took the initiative to organize programmes to create awareness on atrocities against women and supported the victims by organising protest marches/signature campaigns.

3.6.5 Give details of awards/recognition received by the College for extension activities/community development work.

YES. A Certificate of Appreciation was awarded to the college by Fr. Muller Medical College Hospital, Mangaluru for organizing Voluntary Blood Donation Camp on a regular basis, donating 80 - 100 pints of blood at every camp. This has been the best practice of the college for the past seven years.

3.6.6 Reflecting on objectives and expected outcomes of the extension activities organized by the College, comment on how they complement students' academic learning experience and specify the values and skills inculcated.

The extension programmes have inspired students to be responsible citizens who are sensitive to the problems of the underprivileged sections of society. The specific values and skills inculcated are: compassion, empathy, sharing, caring, dignity of labour, environmental consciousness, behavioural skills, leadership qualities, team work, interpersonal skills and civic consciousness. The community service is an integral part of education and the college ensures that every student gets an opportunity to participate in extension activities through Associations/Cells/Clubs and ATC programme. The following activities contribute immensely towards the holistic development of students:

- Maintaining green/plastic free/clean campus
- Organising blood donation camps & donating blood in times of SOS calls
- Distribution of clothes to the poor patients of Government hospitals
- Sharing gifts & utility items with the inmates of orphanages/old age homes
- Visits to schools and villages to create awareness about health and hygiene
- Providing home for the homeless through *Navidad*, a charity show
- Service to the differently abled children of St. Agnes Special School
- Personality development and social awareness programmes
- Visit to the families of endosulphan victims

The Instrumentation Centre of the College was created with the financial assistance received from the DBT, New Delhi, under the STAR College Scheme.




CRITERION - IV INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

St. Agnes College earnestly believes that the culture of care is very important for the holistic development of individuals. However, the college also reckons with the idea that physical infrastructure has its own relevance. Hence the college has made strategic investment in infrastructure for long term growth. Learning Resources are developed keeping in mind the diversity of students and faculty. In the past five years the college has expanded its physical infrastructural facilities to meet the present requirement and the future development.

4.1 Physical Facilities

St. Agnes College has adequate physical facilities and infrastructure for the existing academic programmes, CC/EC activities and administrative functions. The college campus area is spread across seven acres (28,328 Sq. Mts.) and has approximately three acres (12,141 Sq. Mts.) of built up space for the UG block. In addition, there is an exclusive PG Block in an area of 55 cents. There are 47 classrooms in UG and 15 classrooms in PG with the seating capacity ranging from 50 to 110. There are 24 full-fledged departments with departmental libraries, computers with internet facility and intercom. Other infrastructural facilities for the holistic development of staff and students:

4.1.1 How does the college plan and ensure adequate availability of physical infrastructure and ensure its optimal utilization?

The Management of the college foresees the infrastructural requirements of the college and plans for the development of the physical infrastructure to ensure the smooth and effective functioning of the college. The following procedure is followed to ensure adequate physical infrastructural facility:

- Timely supervision of the infrastructure is done.
- The requirements submitted by the faculty at the end of each academic year are fulfilled.
- Online feedback obtained from the students with regard to infrastructure at the end of each academic year is reviewed and considered.
- The Maintenance Department maintains logbook to avail of the common facilities.
- The Management takes necessary decisions on the creation, renovation and repair of the existing buildings on an annual basis.

Physical infrastructure facilities and optimal utilization:

- Classrooms are also used for Honours and Certificate Courses, Remedial Classes, CPT Coaching.
- Infrastructure is utilised for the conduct of competitive examinations on request.
- Class rooms are used by external organisations such as Institute for Management Studies (IMS), Association of Chartered Certified Accountants (ACCA) and for NET coaching.
- The auditorium, conference hall and other facilities are also used by the public to organise programmes. The institution takes it as part of its Institutional Social Responsibility (ISR) and reviews the programmes before giving permission for use. Toastmasters International, Centre for Integrated Learning, White Doves, Make A Difference, Catholic Association of South Kanara and UXCEL have used the auditorium.
- Extending library services to external users through library membership
- Extending sports facilities to various external organisations such as Mangalore University, Government First Grade College for Women, Balmatta, Sarojini Madhusudan D Kushe Trust
- Extending laboratory facilities to various external organisations such as CentreFor Advanced Learning (CFAL), Karnataka Rajya Vigyana Parishath (KRVP) for demonstrations of experiments to school children, teachers and public, St. Agnes Special School for the training of its D.Ed. students, competitions, research work, conference/workshop and training programmes
- The college studio is used by institutions that do not have the facility

- Construction of eight washrooms and renovation of existing ones for students

The College Hostel for girls comprises 64 rooms to accommodate 130 students from UG and PG and 120 students from PUC. All rooms are occupied and there is need for more.

* Recreational facilities

The hostel provides recreational facilities, reading room, library, dining hall, prayer hall and provisions for indoor games.

4.1.6 How does the college cope with the health related support services for its students, faculty and non-teaching staff on the campus and beyond?

- The College has a Health Care Centre with beds for the students to rest in times of ill health. Some non-prescriptive medicines and first aid facilities are made available. When students need special care, further medical assistance is solicited from a Registered Medical Practitioner. Casualties are taken to the nearby hospitals Colaco Nursing Home, City Hospital, SCS Hospital, Father Muller Hospital and KMC Hospital. A residential nurse is available for regular assistance.
- Annual medical check-up is done for all the students.
- Blood typing facility is available in the Microbiology Lab for students if required.
- Seminars, lectures, programmes are conducted for creating awareness on health and hygiene.
- Yoga sessions for staff and Certificate Courses in Yoga for students have been conducted.
- Blood donation camp is conducted once a year.
- Students donate blood in case of SOS calls.

IT Service Management -

Purchasing of Software, Hardware, Servicing and Maintaining of IT Instruments and Hardware are managed by the local vendors. The institution has an annual contract with EMDEES, Mangaluru for installation and maintenance of networking.

Information Security -

EMDEES is responsible for the implementation of Wireless Technology and for enforcing campus network standards and security. All the users connected to the campus network get the Static IP Address enabled access. Standard Firewall and Antivirus Software programmes are installed.

Network Security, Risk Management -

For administrative information security, user level authentication access is followed.



Software Asset Management – Software programmes are purchased based on the demand of the course and the number of terminals. Backup facility is provided for uninterrupted power supply.

- A Maintenance Committee consisting of teaching and support staff is in charge of repairs and maintenance.

Our students are Net-Gen Learners who have grown up with technology. While it is important to upgrade the infrastructure and learning resources keeping in mind the changing times and trends, it is equally important to ensure that technology is used for interaction and not isolation. The attempt on the part of the college has been to maintain the right balance between technology and humane methodology with infrastructural facilities that are conducive for teaching and learning.

CRITERION- V STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

The essence of the words of Martin Luther King, Jr. is richly reflected in the blue print that St. Agnes College has chalked out for the progress and development of its students: 'The function of education is to teach one to think intensively and to think critically. Intelligence plus character – that is the goal of true education.' An educational system isn't worth a great deal if it teaches young people how to make a living but doesn't teach them how to make a life. While inflaming the intellect of its students, the college also wants them to be individuals with a strong value system.

5.1 Student Mentoring and Support

5.1.1 Does the College have an independent system for student support and mentoring? If yes, what are its structural and functional characteristics?

YES. The college has a well-designed independent system for student mentoring and support which helps the college to cater to the differential needs of the students and to provide effective support for their overall growth and advancement.

Structure of the Student Support and Mentoring System

The structure comprises the Principal, Vice- principal, Deans, Controller of Examinations, Staff Council, Faculty and Support Staff. Associations, Cells, Clubs and Committees headed by staff coordinators guide and support the students while attempting their overall development. The student cabinet and class representatives under the guidance of the Vice-principal and Staff Coordinator strive for the smooth functioning of the academic and non-academic activities of the college. Student representatives are also oriented by external trainers for enhancement of their leadership skills.

The structure of the student support system has been depicted in the representation below:



Functional Characteristics

- The time-table allots specific time schedule for Tutorial classes and Value Education/Moral education/Religion classes which are conducted to improve the academic performance and impart value-based education.
- A mentor is appointed for a group of 30-40 students and he/she serves as the value-education teacher of the class and looks into the holistic development of the students. The mentor identifies the need for remedial classes for the academically weak students and these remedial classes are conducted by the departments to improve the academic performance of such students. The faculty interacts with the parents during the distribution of the marks cards of the Even End Semester Examinations which helps parents to monitor the performance and the progress of their ward. Counselling of parents is done by the faculty whenever necessary. Tracking of shortage of attendance by the deans helps in not only aiding the academic growth but also identifying behavioural problems, if any.
- Add-on/Certificate/Diploma courses/Enrichment programmes are conducted for advanced learners to improve their latent skills.
- Various Associations, Cells, Club and Committees focus on relevant areas of student development and progress. The activities of the Student Cabinet, NSS, NCC, YRC, Rangers, Human Rights Education Cell, Women's Cell, Commerce, Management, Science, Psychology Forum, Cultural Association, LITWIT Literary Club, Nature Club, Computer Club, Sports Association and AIDS Awareness Education Cell focus on leadership qualities, personality development, social responsibility, environmental consciousness, literary sensibility and physical agility. Students are encouraged and guided to participate and excel in co-curricular and extracurricular activities. Feedback is collected and suggestions are sought from student representatives during the IQAC meetings.
- The students from economically disadvantaged sections are provided with scholarships, fee concession and mid-day meal facility.
- Career Guidance and Placement Cell provides an opportunity for students to get placed in prestigious organisations.
- The Carmel Counselling Centre (UG) and Navchethana Wellness Centre (PG) render counselling and guidance.
- The Women's Centre organises training programmes and skill-based courses/programmes to our students and school dropouts from our locality.
- Sexual Harassment cum Grievance Redressal Cell and Anti-Ragging Cell provide a forum for students to address their grievances.
- The Equal Opportunity Cell offers inclusive education and is set up to promote equity and greater participation among students of all categories. The Cell promotes access and encouragement for all backward categories of students to avail of facilities and support available in the college and outside, thereby giving a boost to their morale.
- Family Life Education based on pro-life issues is organised for the final year degree students and is efficiently conducted by eminent doctors and counsellors.

- The Annual Prayer Day for the Moral education students and Annual Retreat for the Religion students help them in their spiritual quest.
- Students benefit from well-equipped laboratories, college and departmental libraries.
- For queries regarding examinations students approach the Controller of Examinations.



5.1.2 What provisions exist for academic mentoring apart from class room work?

Students are encouraged and motivated to participate in intra/inter-collegiate workshops, seminars and conferences. 46 UG students and 199 PG students have presented papers at the university, regional and national levels. The English and Psychology Departments at the PG Centre encourage students to write 'Research Style papers' which are later improved upon for paper presentations.

Guest lectures and field visits strengthen the knowledge provided in the classroom. Under the Star College Scheme, the Basic Science Departments have organised industrial and research centre visits, training programmes, project work and internship which have enhanced prospects of higher learning and career building among students.

For the UG students CPT/ACCA/Bank/MAT coaching classes are conducted by the Career Guidance and Placement Cell.

Advanced learners are provided with the necessary guidance to write subject-related articles. Creative writing, quiz, innovative programmes on graphics, mathematical and statistical puzzles are conducted to tap the talents of students. Ms. Anusha and Ms. Vinitha D'Silva from the Physical Science stream were the recipients of the INSPIRE scholarship in 2014-2015.

The alumni share their experiences, the opportunities gained and missed and guide the students to make right choices.

5.1.3 Does the College provide personal enhancement and development schemes for students? If yes, describe techniques employed e.g., career counselling, soft skill development, etc.

YES. The well-established Career Guidance and Placement Cell as well as different departments conduct personal enhancement programmes and career related lectures to help students develop an integrated personality and get to know various avenues open to them after their course of study. The Placement officer of the college guides the students in the campus recruitment process. Experts are invited to provide various techniques and skills to the students

which contribute towards developing the self-esteem of students. Career Oriented Programmes are designed with theory/practicals/assignment/project work to enhance the employability of students.

One of the contributions the college has consistently made is in the area of rendering financial assistance in the form of scholarships, fee concessions, medical aid and mid-day meals. Every year a substantial amount is budgeted exclusively to meet the needs of economically disadvantaged students. In addition, scholarships are given to other deserving and meritorious candidates. The UG and PG students avail of fee concessions from the college and the government. Needy students benefit from the medical aid fund and mid-day meal scheme.

The Student Welfare Committee in the college checks the financial background of the students at the beginning of the academic year and selects needy students for all welfare measures and ensures that the financial aid is made available on time. The PTA, alumni, retired staff and the well-wishers of the college have instituted several scholarships which are awarded as cash prizes to meritorious and deserving students on college day. Freeships are given to economically disadvantaged students at the time of admission.

The college does not have an International Student Cell to cater to the needs of foreign students. However, if any foreign student wishes to enrol, the college provides necessary support to cater to the needs of the student. In the place of second languages – Kannada and Hindi – French is offered. The college also has an adequate hostel facility.

- Ramps are put up at strategic locations

- * SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker section: SC/ST/OBC students are provided fee concessions, scholarships, medical aid, midday meals and remedial classes. They are exempted from paying the registration fee for collegiate and intercollegiate activities. The Department of English at the UG level conducts a 100 hour programme in Communicative English for such students. The college Library and Information Centre organised a three-day state level training programme Digital Empowerment for Sustainable Development for SC Youth, sponsored by Rajiv Gandhi National Institute of Youth Development, Sriperambadur, Chennai, under the Youth Led Sustainable Development Scheme of MHRD, Government of India. 126 SC youth from all over the state participated in the programme.
- * Students to participate in various competitions/conferences in India and abroad: The college encourages students to attend competitions and conferences by paying the registration fee and by giving the students the benefit of attendance. The faculty guides and prepares the students for taking part in such events. The student cabinet forms a team and sees to the robust participation in various events.
- * Health Centre, Health Insurance etc.: The Health Care Centre has a place for rest and provides first aid facility to students. A nurse who resides in the campus offers medical services whenever necessary. The college has MoU with Colaco Hospital, Father Muller Medical Hospital and Kasturba Medical College, Mangaluru. In case of emergency the student is shifted to a hospital within a vicinity of less than a kilometre, accompanied by a staff member.

Annual general health check-up for all the students is organised by the college with the help of the department of Physical Education and a local Physician.

- * Skill Development (Spoken English, Computer Literacy etc.): For the enhancement of skills and development of personality the students attend intra and inter-collegiate workshops and skill development programmes. Departments of English, Business Management, Commerce, Computer Science, Computer Applications, Statistics, Secretarial Practice, Psychology (PG/UG), Library and Information Centre offer Add-on courses and training programmes to enhance soft, communication, computer literacy, social and life skills. The Language Lab helps to enhance the language skills of students.
- * Performance enhancement for slow learners / students who are at risk of failure and dropouts: Students who are slow learners are helped by their respective teachers after class hours and remedial classes are taken up for such students. Simplified study material is provided and advanced learners are identified by the teachers to help the slow learners. Parents and guardians of students who drop out are contacted and an enquiry is made. They are counselled to either resume the course or take up an alternative programme of their choice.

other Exposure of students to institutions higher learning/Corporate/ Business houses etc.: The project work taken up by the Commerce and Management students brings them into contact with other institutions and the corporate sector. The project work taken up by the science stream students enables them to get a scientific bent of mind towards research and development. The internship programme for the UG and PG students exposes them to institutions of higher learning and corporate and business houses. Educational tours and field trips are organised by the UG and PG departments which give the students an exposure to institutes of higher learning. Collaborative lectures were held for students of the PG English Departments of St. Agnes College and St. Aloysius College, under the MoU signed between the two institutions. The UG English Department has signed an MoU with nine educational institutes and takes them as either collaborators or participants in its co-curricular activities.

* Publication of students' magazines:

- The college magazine *Agnezine* has on the editorial board students as editors and assistant editors. Articles are published in English, Hindi, Kannada, Konkani, Malayalam and French.
- The in-house journal gives opportunity for students to publish research-based articles.
- The Newsletter *Agnes Pulse* gives a glimpse of the events that have been organised by the students during the academic year.
- Student research articles have been published in the proceedings of the UGC sponsored National Conferences organised by the College.
- Students contribute articles to Kannada Wikipedia

The Career Guidance and Placement Cell plays a vital role in providing placements for students. Various companies are in touch with the college through the Career Guidance Cell to recruit students. Campus recruitments are regularly held for the benefit of those students who are pursuing professional and vocational courses. Students are trained to write their own resume and to face interviews. Courses are conducted to help

The College has a functioning Alumni Association with its branches spreading from Bengaluru and Mumbai to Kuwait and Dubai. The Mangaluru home chapter is vibrant and felicitates student achievers on International Women's Day, conducts Personality Development Programmes and participates in the important events of the college. The Alumni has extended financial assistance in the form of scholarships to deserving students. Service activities every year become an enlivening experience wherein the alumni visit orphanages, homes for the aged and the destitute. Agnesian Day at Home is an annual feature when the Alumni come together and celebrate their oneness in the college auditorium. *The Agnesian*, an annual newsletter gives a glimpse of the various activities conducted by the chapters in India and abroad. Members of the Association provide feedback and offer suggestions on curricular and extracurricular activities of the college in the monthly meetings. The BOS of every department has an alumna as its member. The Alumni has an active role to play in Navidad – the annual fund raising programme of the college, to build a shelter for the homeless.

YES. The college has a Grievance Redressal Cell with specific objectives for its smooth functioning. In order to collect grievances from students, grievance boxes are placed at strategic points on the campus. During the assembly the Principal conveys to the students steps that are taken to resolve their grievances.

YES. There is an Anti-Ragging Committee. It has been alert, but hitherto no instances of ragging have been reported as the college practices zero tolerance to ragging.

5.1.17 How does the college elicit the cooperation from all stakeholders to ensure overall development of the students considering the curricular and co-curricular activities, research, community orientation, etc.?

The stakeholders of the college include students, parents, members of the teaching community, businessmen and industrialists, employers, members of BOS, members in the governing body, academic council, PTA and the alumni. The stakeholders are invited to all programmes of the college and in many activities they assist the college as organisers.

Every year feedback is collected from them and the information provided by the stakeholders is considered for updating the syllabus, planning co-curricular activities, undertaking research projects and strengthening community involvement. At the monthly PTA meetings suggestions given by the parents are considered and implemented if relevant. The PTA contributes Rs. 50,000/towards the expenditure of the annual NSS camp. Teacher's Day celebration by the PTA strengthens the bond between the faculty and the parents.

The Alumni willingly helps the institute in conducting Personality Development Programmes for the students. Financial assistance is given to the economically disadvantaged students.

Agnes Towards Community (ATC) at the UG level has helped the students to bond with society. The PG students have a mandatory rural exposure programme that gives them first-hand exposure to community service.

5.1.18 What special schemes/mechanisms are in place to motivate students for participation in extracurricular activities such as sports, cultural events, etc?

- Students participating in extra-curricular activities such as sports, NCC, NSS, Rangers/TWS and cultural events are given attendance when they represent the college in their respective fields.
- They are also given the facility of answering the mid semester examination on another date should the event clash with the date of examination.
- The students engage themselves by joining Add On courses, Associations, Forums, Cells or Clubs.
- Two hours per week are reserved for these Extra-curricular activities.
- Students are made aware that being involved in extra-curricular activities gives them an added advantage for employability and University admission under special quota.

5.1.19 How does the College ensure participation of women in 'intra' and 'inter' institutional sports competitions and cultural activities? Provide details of sports and cultural activities in which such efforts were made?

Class-wise competitions are conducted for students after class hours in various sports events. On the Sports Day several competitions in sports and games are held. The College encourages students to pursue interest in sports which has resulted in teams being formed for Volley Ball, Throw Ball, Table Tennis, Chess, Kho Kho, Swimming, Badminton, Basketball, Cricket and Kabaddi.

The teams represent the college in inter-institutional competitions at the regional, state and national level. The college plays host to several inter-collegiate tournaments such as Madhusudan Kushe Throw Ball Tournament and Mangaluru University Swimming, Volley Ball and Cricket Tournaments. National Sports Day was conducted in coordination with the Government First Grade Women's College, Balmatta from 2011 to 2014 under the Apta Mithra Scheme.

Cultural events are given due importance at the departmental and college level. Several workshops have been conducted by the Cultural Association to introduce students to different forms of art and dance. The participants of the workshops learn these dance forms and the same are performed on College Day.


5.2.3 What is the Programme-wise completion rate/dropout rate within the time span as stipulated by the College/University?

The college secured the seventh position among the colleges of the Mangalore University in intercollegiate events for the academic years 2014-2015 and 2015-2016.

On the Annual Sports Day in December, a class-wise March Past based on UNO theme is organised. Track and team events are held infusing in the students the spirit of competition and participation. Class-wise matches are conducted and trophies are awarded to winners.

Class socials are held in July and August wherein maximum participation is realised and opportunities are provided to showcase the talent and creativity of students. Traditional day is observed as part of Independence Day celebrations SSR, St. Agnes College (Autonomous), Mangaluru 151

and a patriotic flavour is evoked with a blend of dances, variety shows and competitions bringing to centre stage the ethnic splendour and ethos of India. INSYNC an intra-collegiate programme in the academic years 2011 to 2013 and activities of various Cells and Associations have brought many students to the forefront to partake in numerous competitions. Annual events such as *Agnofest*— the National Level Intercollegiate Fest at the UG level and *Avishkar* at the PG level hone the leadership skills of students as organisers while providing a platform for utilising their creative potential.

* Co-Curricular

Students from both UG/PG have participated in co-curricular activities such as seminar, workshop, debate, quiz, elocution, puzzle solving, collage and model making at the University and National Level and have won cash prizes and trophies. Students have participated in AIR *Yuvavani* programmes. Vijetha from the Commerce stream has published a book in Kannada 'Katha Karanje'. The Science Day is celebrated every year in collaboration with Science Centre, Pilikula, where informative lectures on current topics like Clean Energy Options and Nuclear Safety are delivered to the students. The Sunday Science School, an extension activity for high school and elementary school students, is a unique concept providing a hands-on experience to the school children and an organisational opportunity to our students. They have also presented papers at various conferences and workshops.

The Department of Biotechnology (DBT), Government of India, New Delhi has given financial assistance to five science departments of the college under the **Star College Scheme** from 2012 to 2015. To mark and acknowledge the outstanding progress achieved by students, the DBT has continued its financial assistance for 2 more years (2015-2017). To attract students towards Basic Sciences, an Experimental Fair and a hands-on training for the Pre-University and Degree students of other colleges were conducted exposing them to the recent advancements in Basic Sciences. St. Agnes College was the only recipient in the State to receive Rupees One Lakh towards the 30 years of DBT celebrations. To mark the event, the Basic Science departments conducted various competitions like debate, mime, quiz, flower arrangement using wild flowers and 'chemrangoli'. The scheme has benefitted the students as the departments have procured instruments, introduced new practical and conducted several projects.

5.3.3 How often does the College collect feedback from students for improving the support services? How is the feedback used?

Students are randomly selected and feedback is collected from them for support services provided in college. Written feedback was collected during the academic years 2011-2012, 2012-2013 and 2013-2014. During the years

2014-2015 and 2015-2016 online feedback was collected using the Google Form. The feedback thus collected is analysed and utilised to bring about improvement in the support services such as library, help line, health centre, canteen, Reprographic Centre and MESCOM Lab.

The college has attempted to elicit responses from students about campus life by dedicating a section of the college magazine for the opinion poll. Every year the section carries the spontaneous and sincere opinion of students to a host of questions ranging from campus life to public issues. The questionnaire is administered by the Value Education teachers during the Value Education hour.

Yes. The College has a mechanism to collect feedback from its graduates. From 2011 to 2014 written feedback was taken and from 2014 onwards online feedback is being taken. The data collected is utilised to bring about relevant changes. The dress code of uniform was implemented in 2013 based on the analysis of the feedback from parents, staff and students. The dress code helps in establishing students' identity, developing social consciousness and focusing on academics.

In addition to *Agnezine* – the annual magazine and *Agnes Pulse* – the annual newsletter, all departments have wall magazines and notice boards to which students contribute regularly. Materials on topics from the syllabus and of general interest are also displayed. This encourages and motivates students to move beyond academics and enhance their information and knowledge. A wall magazine competition is also held every year based on the International UN theme.

The Department of Commerce publishes a bulletin - *Elan* - which covers all the activities of the department in a nut shell, and is given as a souvenir to the outgoing Commerce students.

The college has a Student Council in the UG section comprising Student President, four Vice-presidents and Secretaries of subjects, Cells and Associations. If there is more than one aspiring candidate for these posts, elections are held. The major activities conducted by the College Cabinet are Teacher's Day, Student's Day, Sports Day and Agno Fest. 'Fresh Face of the Year' for the incoming first degree students is a crowd puller. Students are funded by the college to participate in intercollegiate activities. Cash prizes won by the students are utilized by them.

The student council in the PG comprises the President and four Vice-presidents. The position of the student President is on a rotation basis, covering the four PG departments. One Vice-president each is elected from the four departments.

The IQAC has student representation consisting of the College President and the four Vice-presidents. Each department has its subject secretary attending at least one of the departmental meetings in each semester to get an overview of the activities being conducted. Departments conducting extracurricular activities get the involvement of subject secretaries as and when necessary.

GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

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St. Agnes College is on the threshold of celebrating the centennial year in 2020-2021. The college has dauntlessly faced the challenges of a rapidly evolving educational scenario by tapping the wellspring of opportunities like never before. While incorporating the changes demanded by the contemporary world, it has never lost sight of its tradition, vision and mission and is a unique combination of modern education alongside holistic development. The college has well structured policies/practices on all issues from academics to strategy development, managerial policies, planning human resources, training, performance appraisal, financial management and quality assurance. It is a pioneering institution for women's education, established and managed by a private management of the religious sisters of the Apostolic Carmel Congregation. It is the first Women's College in the State of Karnataka and South India.

6.1. Institutional Vision and Leadership

The institution's participative decision making strategy helps to achieve the Vision, Mission, Goals and Objectives of the institution. The management of the college, the Apostolic Carmel Educational Society, is the life force of the administration and all the activities of the college. The Management sustains the institution with utmost care to ensure the imparting of quality education to suit the emerging trends in the market. The Principal is the guiding force, who along with the faculty and the other important stakeholders, including parents, alumni, students and industry has made many major contributions in education and community development. The process is undertaken by the major decision making bodies, and is implemented through the organisation and working of the administrative bodies and the staff council. Various streams of the college and the industry link up to build a better society and nation through meaningful education.

The stakeholders make an inventory of the available human, intellectual, financial and infrastructural resources, and utilize the same most judiciously to achieve the vision and mission of the institution for the development of the nation at large. The policies and practices of the college, academic and administrative planning and implementation reflect the institution's efforts towards a consistent growth for the development of society through education in this region.

The College which was conceived as a Golden Jubilee Memorial of the Apostolic Carmel Congregation way back in 1920 has education as its mission from its inception. The institutional perspective, objective and curriculum design have stemmed from the vision and the mission of the Foundress Mother Mary Aloysia. These are actualized in the functioning of the college through the following initiatives:

- **The curriculum** is designed in accordance with the vision and mission of the college by all the departments.
- Value education classes are incorporated into the time table and are backed up by a specially designed text book exclusively prepared by the faculty of the college. Besides, the teachers impart humanitarian values through life of example, precepts and core subjects. The Value Education Course is further strengthened through the implementation of projects that incrementally grow over a span of three years: personality development and self realization projects in the first year; society, national and environmental issues in the second year; the life values of love, peace, joy and justice in the final year.
- Weekly Moral education/Religion classes, and days of prayer and reflection help to inculcate spirituality. Interested and talented students are encouraged to be the members of the college choir and are trained to sing hymns/songs, culminating in the devotional spirit.
- Each day begins with prayer on the PAS by the students on a rotational basis. Important national, regional and religious festivals are celebrated with a special prayer and cultural events to mark the same.
- In order to strengthen the faith life of the catholic students and keep alive the founding Charism of the Apostolic Carmel, several measures have been taken which include, weekly religion classes, celebration of the Eucharist on all the important feast days and annual retreats.
- All the above efforts aim at strengthening students to become integrated women, developing work-life balance and living a God-centric life as per the motto of the college *God is our strength*.


- To foster and intensify the goals of national integration, unity and harmony in diversity, the NSS, NCC, YRC, Rangers/TWS, Harmony Club and ATC help the students to build personal and national leadership qualities. All the national festivals and days of national importance such as Independence Day, Republic Day, Peace Day, Gandhi Jayanthi, International Women's Day, Kannada Rajyothsava, Hindi Divas, World Environment Day, AIDS Awareness Day and the Librarians' Day are celebrated. The celebrations and competitions conducted during the Traditional Week give an opportunity for students to showcase their talents. The various extracurricular and co-curricular activities conducted through Women's/Human Rights Education/AIDS Awareness Education Cell of the college aim to deepen convictions, and reinforce empowerment and action for the restoration of women's dignity and human rights.
- The green initiative programmes such as watershed management, rain water harvesting, soak pits to recharge ground water, waste management, biogas, cleanliness drive on the campus/city, bottle gardening and maintenance of garden help to nurture eco-friendly culture among students.

The Management System of the Apostolic Carmel Educational Society comprising the Provincial Superior, the Educational Secretary, the Superior of St. Agnes Convent and Joint Secretary makes policies, plans developmental strategies and directs the Principal towards the implementation of the same. The Principal guides the college in academic progress, admissions, staff recruitment and administrative matters. The Governing Body steers implementation. The Academic Council approves the course structure and policy matters recommended by the Board of Studies of different departments. The Vice Principal, the Deans and the IQAC help the Principal in the overall administration which involves the planning of the academic calendar and its systematic implementation. The Controller of Examinations monitors the evaluation process. The staff council and faculty members play an important role in executing the curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular programmes. This process is undertaken through the organisation and working of the committees, associations and cells which bring together various stakeholders to realise the objectives of the institution.

Interaction with stakeholders

The college keeps in touch with all its stakeholders continuously and makes efforts to improve the overall organisational effectiveness through regular feedback from students, faculty, parents, alumni and employers. The feedback is analysed and constructive suggestions are implemented.

- Regular meetings of the Student Cabinet along with class representatives are held to plan the calendar of events.
- Regular meetings with the Staff, Semester-wise meetings of the staff council and general staff meetings are held by the Principal to plan and evaluate curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. The Department Heads make a brief presentation of the department highlights and the future plans on the day of evaluation. The IQAC organises an annual audit of the departments and offers constructive suggestions.
- Parent Teacher Meetings, Results Programmes and the participation of the
 parents in all the major activities of the college make the parents active
 collaborators in the process of teaching and learning. In special cases such
 as absenteeism in class, examinations and in other disciplinary matters,
 parents are called for personal meeting with the principal/ deans/mentors.
- The Alumni Association organises programmes such as Agnesian Day at Home and honours an outstanding Agnesian; conducts service activities and entertainment programmes for the inmates of Destitute Homes / Children's Homes/Orphanages/HIV Rehabilitation Centres; holds personality development programmes for a selected group of final year UG students in association with Catholic Association of South Kanara (CASK); organises Mother Mary Aloysia A.C. Endowment Lectures and honours eminent Alumnae for lifetime achievement for significant contributions to society; felicitates the best outgoing students of four different fields and publishes the annual newsletter *The Agnesian*.
- Feedback from the employers helps in giving the required soft-skill training to the final year UG and PG students. Every BOS has an industry

representative who ensures that the syllabus designed is industry oriented. UG students go for industrial visits while PG students take up industry associated project work and internship.

Teaching-learning blends the traditional and the modern with a variety of teaching tools: chalk and talk, ICT modules, interdisciplinary activities at the UG level, Interdisciplinary course at PG level, enrichment programmes for the faculty to maintain excellence in curriculum.

The IDBOS ensures that every student is enrolled in extra-curricular activities and co-curricular activities are conducted. Various Associations/Cells/Clubs organise extra curricular activities on a weekly basis. The Equal Opportunity Cell provides the under-privileged students adequate representation and opportunities to excel in various collegiate and intercollegiate activities, sports and games.

*Reinforcing culture of excellence

The college maintains a culture of excellence through sound academics with a highly upgraded curriculum and continuous internal assessment throughout the year. Organisation and participation in seminars/workshops/conferences and training programmes at the collegiate/university/state /national/international levels enabled faculty/students to reinforce culture of excellence. Students have benefitted from the research projects undertaken through the DBT Star College Scheme. Coaching classes are conducted ACCA/CPT/MAT/NET/SLET/Bank and competitive examinations to enhance employability. Talent exchange takes place through mega events such as Agnofest, Avishkar, Sports Meet and other intercollegiate events conducted annually.

Based on the institutional goals and objectives and those of every department, the Master Plan of the institution has been drawn up.


The Internal Quality Assurance Cell along with the Quality Circles functions as the quality enhancement and sustenance body and monitors/evaluates the various activities of the institution.

- The faculty members express their constraints regarding teaching-learning and other matters of concern, during the annual audit of the IQAC and through the questionnaires administered by the Principal during the annual evaluation session. The non-teaching staff members express their concerns to the management, Principal/Vice Principal in writing and through interactions.
- Counelling is offered at the Carmel Counselling Centre (UG) and Navchethana Wellness Centre (PG).

Redressal for Student Grievances:

The Grievance Redressal, Anti-ragging Cell, Anti-sexual Harassment Cell, Equal Opportunity Cell and the student Welfare Committee work for the wellbeing of students. Bare-foot counselling by subject teachers/value education teachers/ mentors and professional counselling by experts at the Counselling Centres of the college address student grievances.

• Students with grievances approach the Grievance Redressal Cell to resolve their issues or make use of the grievance boxes. The Cell counsels students and tries to settle issues and solve problems amicably. Information about the functioning of the Cell is given on the Orientation Day and during value education classes.

The mechanism for expressing grievances and their redressal:

- Grievances which need a Counsellor's response are referred to the counselling centres.

The institution incorporates gender auditing to enhance inclusiveness. While UG programmes are exclusively for women, PG is co-education. In all programmes of PG, the ratio of female students to male students is higher.

In General Education Studies, one paper is dedicated to issues concerning women. The Value Education text has chapters dealing with the concept of gender. The members of the Women's Cell take special interest in creating awareness about gender issues. On International Women's Day each year the outstanding performers are recognized and rewarded. The male and female staff members work in collaboration with one other.

YES. The college is a pioneering institution in women's education with the rich legacy of ten decades. Through the Women's Cell and Women's Studies Centre gender sensitization programmes are conducted. On International Women's Day, the college conducts special programmes to create awareness on gender issues. The National Conference organized by the IQAC had a special focus on women's education with eminent speakers such Ms Flavia Agnes, a legal expert and feminist and Dr. Sunitha Krishnan, Padmashree Awardee, addressing faculty/students on gender sensitization.

The Endowment Lecture Series which started in 2014-15 has witnessed eminent women from different walks of life delivering lectures on issues related to women. The Endowment Lecture is dedicated to Mother Mary Aloysia, the Foundress of the college and the first woman recipient of the prestigious National Award *Kaiser-i-Hind* Gold Medal of the First Class, in recognition of her contributions in the field of women's education by the then British government of India in 1929.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of financial resources?

The finance committee draws up the budget after careful consideration of the grants, fees and other resources. The budget and expenditure are discussed and approved by the Governing Body. The major expenses include government/university fees, examination, salary, infrastructure development, equipment, library books, water, electricity, telephone, internet, printing and stationery.

The maintenance committee monitors material resources, assets and maintenance. Tenders are invited on all major expenditures. A maintenance repair register helps the staff to make entries and different types of repair work are handled on a daily/weekly/monthly/annual basis. The requirements of each department are listed and submitted to the principal of the college, who in turn makes arrangements for adequate supplies at the beginning of the academic year.

Grants received are carefully planned, allocated and utilised as per the directives of the funding authority. The funds allocated are optimally used for various academic, extension, curricular, co-curricular, extra-curricular activities and programmes. The Payments are done in cheque/DD for bills that exceed ₹5,000/-.

6.4.2 Does the college have a mechanism for internal and external audit? Give details.

YES. The financial internal audit is conducted annually by an approved auditor, who checks the receipts/payments of all college accounts. The external financial audit of the utilization of funds is done annually. Audits carried out by the government through Accountant General, Bengaluru and Joint Director of Collegiate Education, Mangaluru ensure proper maintenance of assets/documents/audited statements as per the statutes and guidelines. A management representative oversees the process of auditing.

The management decides on the fee structure of the different programmes for a year. Financial Resources are mobilized through:

- Central Government Schemes and Projects of UGC, DBT and RGNIYD
- State Government Scholarships and Fee concessions
- Sponsorships to organise major events such as Agno-Fest, Navidad, National/State Level Seminars/Conferences from generous alumni, parents, sponsors, well wishers, banks and industries

- Small Townships/Campuses under the Scheme of MHRD, MNRE, Government of India for Renewable Energy installation on the campus

YES. The interest of the corpus fund is used towards the salary of the management staff.

The donations made by the alumni and the retired staff are kept as the fixed deposit and the interest is used to give scholarship to students.

YES. The IQAC conducts academic audit of every department annually, reviews the progress and gives suggestions for improvement.

- The central body consists of the Principal, Vice Principal, Deans, IQAC and Quality Circles that continuously review teaching-learning process.
- Recruitment of faculty is done after demo-lectures and classes taken are periodically supervised by the central body.
- Each IQAC member is entrusted with the responsibility of continuously reviewing the teaching-learning process of two departments.
- Unitization of the syllabus, analysis of the performance of students in tests and participation in staff enrichment programmes feature in the work diary which is checked by the central body.
- Annual online feedback and written feedback by students and all other stakeholders are in practice.
- The central body scrutinizes the results at the annual meetings.

6.5.4 How has IQAC contributed to institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes?

- Annual academic audit is conducted systematically to maintain quality.
- Quality Circles function under the guidance of the IQAC to sustain quality.
- Feedback of the major programmes is obtained on a structured questionnaire.
- Meetings are conducted with all the stakeholders to study the quality culture of the college.
- Each IQAC member is in charge of two departments to review quality measures and their implementation.
- When important decisions are to be taken, the IQAC seeks the opinion of the faculty by requesting them to include such points on the agenda of the departmental meetings.
- The IQAC directs departments to take feedback from students on the overall performance of the department.
- The IQAC conducts staff enrichment programmes, brings out a research-based in-house journal and organises the endowment lecture series and felicitates the most distinguished alumna.
- The IQAC has taken eco-friendly measures such as conducting a workshop on Bottle Gardening.
- The IQAC has organised a UGC sponsored National Level Conference on Quality Initiatives in Higher Education with a Special Focus on Women's Education, enabling the faculty and students to present and publish papers.

6.5.5 Does the IQAC have external members on its committees? If so, mention any significant contribution made by such members.

YES. The IQAC has eminent scholars/industrialists/educationists as external members. They have contributed richly to the 'Think Tank' of the college. They have provided input sessions on quality initiatives and have enabled collaboration/linkages with industries. They have organised leadership development programmes for student leaders.

6.5.6 Has the IQAC conducted any study on the incremental academic growth of students from disadvantaged sections of society?

YES. Through the Career Guidance and Counselling Cell and Equal Opportunity Cell, the IQAC has ensured the participation of disadvantaged sections of society in personality and soft skill development programmes. Other measures taken to enhance the academic growth of such students include monitoring by class teachers, arranging remedial classes, providing additional number of library books and support services.

6.5.7 What policies are in place for the periodic review of administrative and academic departments, subject areas, research centers, etc.?

The college has the spirit of inclusiveness and has a democratic set up in place for the periodic review of its various functions.

- Annual, semester-wise and need-based meetings of various decision making bodies ensure the smooth administrative and academic functioning.
- The college makes it a point to gather feedback from its various stakeholders before implementing major or minor decisions.
- The internal annual audit of the departments by the IQAC helps in quality sustenance and quality initiatives.
- The external audit by the government/university bodies takes care of the periodic review of the administrative body.

St. Agnes College is a lighthouse on a hill where all stakeholders come together in ensuring the progress of the college with focus on quality. Governance, Leadership and Management are the three pillars on which rests the quality of an institution and the college has maintained high standards and has contributed towards nation building through the mission of women's education.

CRITERION - VII INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

Innovation is the buzz word of the day and innovation is synonymous with success. Thinking outside the box and looking beyond the obvious are the two tools that can make the process of teaching and learning an enriching experience. However, if innovation in the corporate world is needed for the very survival of the stake holders, innovation in the educational set-up is necessary to make students move beyond the academic framework. The kind of innovation that is valued in the field of knowledge today is that which makes students environmentally sensitive and socially relevant. St. Agnes College has adhered to this ideal with earnestness.

7.1 Environment consciousness

St. Agnes College is one among the few green campuses in the city. Being aware of the fact that education needs to be linked to environment consciousness, we respond to eco-concerns with eco-friendly initiatives. Many activities are undertaken to make the campus environment friendly and to increase the sensitivity of students to ecological issues. The activities include concrete steps such as seminars, symposia, workshops, hands-on training, competitions and awareness programmes to improve the environment.

7.1.1 Does the institute conduct a green audit of its campus?

The college has undertaken green initiatives on the campus.

- An initiative to label most of the flora of the campus has been undertaken and an inventory of the same has been prepared.
- Documentation of the fauna of the college campus was prepared by the members of the Nature Club.
- The Department of Commerce under its extension activity and certificate course on Waste Management created awareness on hazards/disposal/ recycling of waste by staging skits/mimes in schools/colleges and other public platforms. The department collaborated with the Zilla Panchayat and the Mangaluru City Corporation in organising Waste Management Awareness activities.
- Students joined hands with the authorities concerned through *Agnes Towards Community*, NSS and NCC, in response to the call given by the Honorable Prime Minister Sri Narendra Modi for Swachh Bharath.
- To know the quality of the water we consume, to detect the presence of coliform (sewage contamination) in the drinking water and to create awareness about the waterborne diseases caused due to the presence of the pathogens in water, water samples are tested by the faculty/students of the Microbiology Department, using the Multiple Fermentation Tube Technique.
- The *Green Guards* programme by the History Department is undertaken to maintain the cleanliness of the college campus.

- The English Department has adopted the practice of felicitating achievers and guests with a sapling.
- PPT presentations and on-line submission of assignments are encouraged as an eco-friendly measure.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the College to make campus eco-friendly?

The greenery of the campus is enhanced through maintenance of garden, use of bio-fertilizers and vermicompost, keeping the place free of weeds, plastics and litter. To ensure the development of greenery inside the campus, flower pots are placed in the college premises. A gardener is appointed for the maintenance work. Plant wastes are used for vermicompost and organic waste is managed efficiently using vermin-technology. A programme on waste management organised for 500 students of I year Degree has been successful in creating awareness about organic waste management through Vermicomposting. Guppy breeding and distribution are done through an Addon programme and the fingerlings are put into open tanks/wells on the campus to effectively control the breeding of mosquitoes which in turn helps in controlling malaria.

To minimize the usage of paper, online MCQ tests and Online Feedback by the stakeholders are conducted. As an initiative to promote and recycle paper, demonstrations on the skill of preparing paper bags from waste newspapers are regularly held. Various departments have conducted a number of competitions such as Essay/Slogan writing, Mime, Skit, Variety entertainment, and Paper bag making bringing to centre-stage the concept of 'Wealth out of Waste'. The Cells, Associations and Clubs take initiatives to organise a plethora of events each year to create awareness among the faculty and students.

- The Department of Commerce under the banner of "Community Awareness Campaign Programme on Solid Waste Management" organized an Awareness Week and number of programmes on Solid Waste Management to create awareness on the impact of waste, recycling, reusing and reducing waste in the campus and community.
- The Nature Club organises common programmes on issues such as pollution prevention, water harvesting, power conservation and cleanliness. Seminars and screening of nature related movies on topics such as Family Farming, Nature, Deserts, Trees Caretakers of the Planet, Ethical Treatment of Animals, Modernisation Affecting Animals, Snakes and their Environment have been organised for the members. The Environmental Week is celebrated during the first week of July. Some of the activities are: messages on the PAS, painting competition on topics connected to nature, distribution of saplings which are collected from the Forest Department and debates on issues concerning the environment. The Club maintains a herbal garden and publishes *Nisarga*, an annual magazine which contains the collection of articles and paintings compiled by the members of Nature Club.

- The Science Forum members organise various competitions, seminars and discussions on topics such as pollution control, environmental hazards, global warming, astronomy, pathogens, chemistry in daily life, plastic menace, medicine and health.
- The AIDS Awareness Education Cell promotes active involvement in group discussions and seminar presentations on topics such as natural calamities, disaster management, health and hygiene.
- The Harmony Club organises painting, poster making and other competitions for the members on environment and family farming.
- NCC cadets and NSS volunteers are actively involved in campus Shramadhan, Swachh Mangaluru Rally and Swachh Bharath Abhiyan.
- The Cleanliness Committee monitors the overall cleanliness of the campus. Dustbins are placed inside the classrooms and at different points on the campus. Garbage and e-waste are disposed of in an efficient manner. Instructions are given on the PAS to keep the campus clean.
- The Women's Cell conducted a workshop on the 'Role of Adolescents in Environment Conservation' and a seminar on 'Vocational Training and Awareness of Environmental Cleanliness', benefitting 65 women from under-privileged sections of society.
- The IQAC conducted a workshop on bottle gardening and the knowledge gained was shared with other educational institutions as an extension activity. A practical demonstration was aired on the local TV channel to create awareness among the public.

* Energy conservation and use of renewable energy

- Solar water heaters and biogas units are installed for conservation of energy.
- Prize winning working models on solar energy were prepared by the students of Economics Department as part of University Level competitions.

* Water Harvesting

Rain water harvesting has been effectively implemented on the college campus. Through water shed management water is collected and let into pits at various points which have resulted in an increase in the level of the water table. This is an indicator to the institution's social concern because the benefits are largely enjoyed by the residents of the neighbouring communities. In addition, there have been multifarious activities taken up on different occasions:

• To create awareness in society about rain water harvesting, green vegetation, soil erosion and ecosystem, the Department of Microbiology organised a programme on "Ecosystem Sustainability". A working model of rainwater harvesting was planned and executed in the department. The model was exhibited during the Model Making intercollegiate competition held at Alva's College, Moodbidri, organised by Karnataka Rajya Vijnana Parishat, Bengaluru, Government of Karnataka.

• The NSS volunteers share the knowledge of water shed management with the residents of the communities where annual camps are held.

* Efforts for carbon neutrality

• PG Chemistry Department has introduced the new component of 'green practicals' in the curriculum to bring down environmental pollution.

* Plantation

- Vanamahothsava is celebrated in the college with the distribution of flowering and medicinal plants to the students and staff.
- The college had the special privilege of being visited by the internationally renowned environmentalist *Saalumarada Thimmakka*, a centenarian, who along with our students planted saplings along the dividers, outside the campus, to be maintained by the college. This gesture of Institutional Social Responsibility earned appreciation from the local MLA Sri J R Lobo and the Mayor Sri Harinath.

* Hazardous Waste Management

- Green Chemistry and Micro-scale experiment concepts are adopted by the Science Departments to reduce the production of hazardous wastes.
 Techniques of Green Chemistry are taught and project work on green synthesis is conducted.
- Exhaust fans are provided wherever necessary to avoid exposure to hazardous gases.
- Fume hood is installed in the Chemistry laboratory for the safe discharge of hazardous gases.
- * E-waste Management Unused old computers, UPS, CPU, Monitors, and calculators are disposed of efficiently with the help of external vendors.

7.2 Innovations

The College has gone an extra mile in ensuring that students are given the opportunity to think laterally and explore new possibilities in the arena of teaching and learning.

7.2.1 Provide details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the College.

Curriculum Design and Development

All departments have spelt out their goals, objectives and action plans in the institutional Master Plan.

- A curriculum focusing on Employability/Innovation/Research is designed for students. Internship, Rural Exposure Programmes, Service Learning and Research Paper Presentations enrich the learning process.
- Introduction of need-based courses such as General Education, Women's Studies, Journalism, Human Resource Management and Disaster Management have been included as topics of study.
- In order to have academic flexibility, the system of offering Electives for Core subjects is in practice.

- Certificate courses such as Communicative English, Hindi Translation, and Soft Skills for professional competency and language proficiency have been introduced.
- A new undergraduate programme for Commerce students Integrated B.Com. with Association of Chartered Certified Accountants (ACCA) in association with International Skill Development Corporation (ISDC), UK.
- Value Education/Moral education/Religion classes are taken up regularly and the text books for the same are prepared by the faculty.
- Additional eight Add-on courses, five ECA Programmes and seven Certificate/Diploma Courses have been introduced during 2011-2016.

Teaching-Learning and Evaluation

To make learning more student-centric with relevant methodologies, innovations have been brought into teaching methodologies with the enhanced usage of latest technologies such as Interactive Board and LCD. The application of progressive technologies namely Computer for Chemists, SPSS and R Statistical Software in teaching has promoted the student-centric learning process.

- **Practical Training in Soft Skills** has enabled the advanced learners to develop their organisational/public speaking skills and personality.
- **Vigilant Secretary** has given an impetus to the slow learners to improve their grasping, evaluation and presentation abilities.
- The **Easy Stat** programme has helped students understand the proper usage of statistical tools.
- **Psychology Exhibition** on subject-related topics has assisted the students in putting theory into practice while also tapping the creativity and talent of students.
- Research Oriented Studies on the lives, works and contributions of eminent economists and entrepreneurs in the field of Economics, taken up by the Economics students, have created in them the desire to acquire skills to become Entrepreneurs in their own lines of interest.
- Rural Exposure/Industrial Visits/Educational Tours have added to the experiential learning of students.

The financial assistance provided by the **Star College Scheme**, **DBT**, **New Delhi** has brought about the following innovations:

The college has employed 'best practices' which have a visible impact on the quality of education and influence students positively in serving society.

7.3.1 Give details of any two best practices which have contributed to better academic and administrative functioning of the College.

1. Title: Agnes Towards Community (ATC)

Goals:

- * To sensitize students towards community service
- * To inculcate values of concern, compassion and commitment
- * To equip students with organising and leadership skills

The Context: Keeping in mind the above goals, the students in association with NGOs - PADI, Canara Organisation for Development and Peace (CODP) and *Shubhada* - have reached out to different villages in educating them about Child Helpline, atrocities against women, Endosulfan victims, schemes and benefits of Gram Panchayat/ Government, exercise of franchise, problems of migrant/construction workers and need for basic literacy.

The Practice: Final Year Degree students under the guidance of their teachers take up Community Service on Saturdays. The practice involves planning, preparation, execution and evaluation.

Evidence of Success:

- * The fund raising by students to alleviate the suffering of the Endosuflan victims with the donation of a wheel chair and contributions towards the construction of a new house
- * An increase in attendance in Grama Sabha/Grama Panchayat meetings and the franchise exercised in Gram Panchayats
- * The Swachh Bharath Abhiyan influencing the students to maintain cleanliness in the community and on the campus, reflecting a progressive change in attitude

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

- * The large number of students poses problems of coordination while implementing the task.
- * Girl students face the setback of reaching people at the grass root level.
- * The financial resources are limited to implement the programmes at a larger scale.

2. Title: The Annual Academic Audit by the Internal Quality Assurance Cell

Goals:

- * To maintain and enhance quality
- * To ensure the timely upgrading of documents
- * To formulate the action plan of the department/college
- * To monitor the goals and objectives spelt out by the departments
- * To suggest corrective measures and progressive strategies for improvement
- * To explore the opportunities of starting new courses and programmes and make recommendations

The Context: As per the directive of the National Assessment and Accreditation Council, the IQAC was formed in the year 2000 to facilitate the smooth functioning of the institution.

The Practice: Every year in March/April the IQAC conducts the Annual Academic Audit of all UG/PG departments and student support systems such as office, library, sports and canteen.

Each IQAC member scrutinises the profile of two departments and offers suggestions for improvements.

Official records such as attendance registers, work diaries, BOS/BOE records, CIA entries, ECA/Certificate/Diploma Courses, outreach/extension activities, conferences/workshops/seminars organised and attended, paper presentations and publications, remedial classes, innovative programmes for advanced learners, student achievements are inspected during the departmental visits.

Evidence of Success:

- * A commendable increase in paper presentations/publications, seminars/workshops/conferences organised and other research activities such as publication of in-house journal, internship, research-oriented project work by both faculty and students
- * Improved system of documentation
- * Formulation of the Master Plan for the institution
- * Active involvement of the external members in holding programmes of quality initiatives for both faculty and students
- * Positive response from students to online MCQ tests and Feedback

Problems Encountered and Resources Required: As the college is affiliated to Mangalore University a few desired changes such as Choice Based Credit System could not be implemented. The college could not tap the funding of resources from various agencies to the full extent.

Other best practices of the College

- **NAVIDAD** Christmas Charity Fund raising Show to provide a shelter for the homeless.
- **Family Life Education:** Educating final year degree students on various issues pertaining to marriage and family life.
- **IDBOS:** Under autonomy the IDBOS frames syllabus for the Value Education/Moral education/ Religion classes. Under the mandatory papers in General Education special emphasis has been given for women's education and gender equity. The IDBOS also monitors Add-on Courses, Certificate Courses and Extra Curricular activities.
- Mandatory Project Work/Internship: Students get an exposure to basic research and opportunities for internship and turn out to be independent thinkers with augmented job opportunities.
- Sunday Science School: To move beyond academics and develop scientific temper, the department of Chemistry has taken up Sunday Science School Project for school children, a concept promoted by L-Green Ventures, Bangaluru in collaboration with Centre for Advanced Learning (CFAL), Mangaluru. The aim is to give hands-on experience and develop scientific literacy.
- **Hindi Day Celebration:** The observation of the day helps popularise Hindi as the national language, creates awareness on career opportunities in Hindi and taps the creative talent in Hindi.
- **Public Address System:** Every department takes the responsibility to conduct prayer session every morning before the commencement of class. The session includes prayer, message on a particular theme for the week with anecdotal references, thought for the day, news headlines and important notices.
- Student Cabinet: Student leaders are vibrant carrying out responsible tasks with conscientiousness. In addition to conducting various competitions/activities/celebrations, they offer their services to maintain discipline/cleanliness, to serve food at the canteen during peak hours and train the juniors for intercollegiate competitions. The stamp of excellence of these leaders is recognized on the Annual Day with trophies and certificates.
- The College Band: The college band, trained by an external expert, a parttime professional Musician, rises to every important occasion of the college with Guard of Honour, making the campus come alive with music and rhythm. On the Merit Certificate Day, the members get certified for their contributions throughout the year.
- St. Agnes Special School Vocational Training Centre enjoys the patronage of St. Agnes College which buys note books and hand-made flowers prepared by the **differently** abled children. The Psychology Department aims to enhance the level of acceptance of the differently abled and to render service to the children of St. Agnes Special School by way of teaching, writing and reading. Art, craft, dance and music also come under the purview of the service by students.

- **Helpline:** Manned entirely by Commerce students, under the supervision of a faculty member, the Helpline, true to its name, assists in supplying stationery and other requirements in the morning and during the lunch break. The profit is utilised to pay the examination fees of the students who generously serve their alma mater. The college shows its appreciation of the selfless service by honouring them with certificates on the Merit Day.
- Aptha Mithra Yojana: The college has adopted the Government First Grade College for Women, Balmatta under the Aptha Mithra Yojana of the Government of Karnataka, and has provided the facilities of the college to organise their programmes.
- The Alumni Scholarship has helped economically disadvantaged students to pursue higher studies.
- The Alumni Association is a strong global network and the parent association honours an Agnesian Achiever on the annual Agnesian Day at Home. The executive members conduct social service activities for the underprivileged and also bring out the annual newsletter *The Agnesian*.
- **Planting Saplings:** When Principals/faculty reach superannuation, saplings are planted to enhance greenery on the campus.
- Counselling Centre: Carmel counselling centre at UG, Navchethana at PG provides counselling to different sections of society.
- Women's Centre aims at empowering the less fortunate women and school drop outs through skill-based courses and Self Help Groups.
- Celebration of Women's Day: International Day for Women in association with the Women's Cell and the alumni of the College is celebrated every year and four student achievers are honoured.
- **Blood Donation:** Annual blood donation camps are organised and about 80-100 pints of blood are collected and given to Fr. Muller's Medical College Hospital, Mangaluru. Besides whenever there is an SOS call students generously donate blood to save lives.
- **Blood Typing Programme:** The programme aims to make students aware of their blood group and understand the significance of each blood group/blood donation/Rh factor during pregnancy. The Department of Microbiology has performed blood typing for an average of 150 students every year.

The college has put in tremendous efforts to make education an enriching experience for students. The refrain of the college is to take education beyond the precincts of the ordinary so as to make it an extraordinary experience for both faculty and students.

Post-accreditation Initiatives

The legacy of the past carries with it the onus of making the present meaningful so as to impact the future positively. Therefore, our vision for the future must propel us to be the wind beneath the wings of change in the present.

St. Agnes College was gratified when it earned an A Grade with the CGPA of 3.53 in Cycle 3 of Reassessment and Reaccreditation by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) in 2012. The following suggestions were given by the NAAC for further improvement of the college:

- 1. Need-based courses in emerging areas to be introduced
- 2. Choice-based Credit System (CBCS) may be introduced

2. Choice-Based Credit System (CBCS) may be introduced.

The college has the CBCS at the PG Level. A Comprehensive Revision of the Curriculum was done in 2014-15 to introduce the CBCS at the UG Level as well. However, even after painstaking preparations from all the departments, CBCS could not be introduced at the UG Level as Mangalore University, to which the college is affiliated, denied permission for its implementation. The stipulation was that the CBCS could be introduced by the college for the UG programme only after it was introduced by Mangalore University for the non-autonomous colleges.

3. Learner-centric teaching methodology may be augmented.

It is generally accepted that a learner-centred approach to teaching alters the role played by the learners. It is seldom pointed out that learner-centred teaching involves a parallel change in the teacher's role. The teacher has to

5. Upgrading Teacher Qualifications

To encourage staff members to pursue higher education, seed money is given to the management staff for Ph.D. studies. The following figures indicate the enhancement of knowledge with additional qualifications between 2011 and 2016:

- Staff members who have completed M.Phil.: 05
- Staff members who have cleared NET/KSET/SET: 11

Ultimately, the maxim on which the college relies is the truth that the personal rather than the professional qualities of a teacher impact the psyche of students. Hence even as teachers upgrade their knowledge, they go that extra mile in being the mentors of the young pupils entrusted to their care.

6. Faculty may be encouraged to avail research grants from various funding agencies.

Quality attracts quality. A stamp of quality is possible only when an institution has a strong research base. The college has judiciously used the funds availed of from various research agencies, and reaped the maximum benefit, ensuring the constant advancement of faculty and students.

- The college has conducted 20 national and 10 state level workshops/seminars/conferences.
- The college has received grants for one major and eleven minor research projects.
- Dr. Manjula B. C., Associate Professor of Economics received travel grant of Rs. 1,32,946 from the UGC to attend an international conference in Germany from 22 to 25 July 2014.
- The college is funded by the DBT, New Delhi under the Star College Scheme, initiated in 2013. Basic Science Departments: Botany, Chemistry, Physics, Microbiology and Zoology have undertaken several research initiatives. Students have taken up 39 research projects from 2013 to 2016.

7. Develop Research Centres.

Research is creating new knowledge. St. Agnes College has been ever enthusiastic to tap the new avenues of knowledge. The quest for research has been fulfilled with the recognition of Research Centre by Mangalore University. The Research Centre at PG has adequate infrastructural facilities and resources enabling the faculty/students to pursue research studies. The faculty members have applied for permission to guide the research scholars and a new Research Block is under construction.

8. To expand the Physical Infrastructure Facilities for Learning.

Infrastructure aids human capital and human potential to do great things by offering a work-friendly ambience. It has been the endeavour of the college to ensure that the faculty and students enjoy a healthy teaching and learning environment by upgrading the infrastructural facilities on a timely basis.

- Under the DBT Star College scheme the existing laboratories have been upgraded with instruments, equipment and glassware.
- The old and obsolete hardware and software are replaced and upgraded from time to time. Davlin software cloud based, is used for online MCQ test/CIA mark entry/attendance/feedback/result. Windows Server 2012 R2 Standard Data Base: Microsoft SQL Server 2014, Intel (R) Xeon (R) CPU E5:2.40 GHZ has been newly installed.
- The campus is equipped with LAN/lease line/WiFi facility.
- Classrooms, washrooms, furniture and other fixtures are upgraded from time to time. Existing washrooms have been renovated and six wash rooms have been added.
- The college canteen and the open air stage have been renovated.
- An air-conditioned new Board Room has been set up.
- The Examination Section has been shifted and modified for easy accessibility and confidentiality.
- The IQAC Room has been renovated.
- CC TV has been installed as safety measure.

9. To provide additional facilities for sports and games.

St. Agnes College respects multiple intelligences that are present in students and gives them the chance to shine in their chosen field of specialty. The college has taken significant measures to encourage sportsmanship:

- A well-maintained gym
- Special coaching by external experts for major games and sport events
- Preference for sports achievers during admission
- Attendance and re-examination for sports students
- Breakfast for athletes at the time of training

10. Have a Master Plan for the college for its future development.

The College chalked out a prospective and strategic Master Plan 2012-2022 with definite goals, objectives and action plans at both institution and department level.

- A Strategic Planning Committee comprising the Principal, Vice-Principal, External Advisor as Chairperson, Member Secretary, Literature Expert, Scientist and other senior staff members was formed.
- The team received guidance from the Chairperson Dr. Aloysius Sequeira, Professor, NITK, Surathkal.
- The Vision and Mission statements of the college were revisited, scrutinized and approved by the Management representatives so as to ensure that the college moved with the changing times.

- Based on the guidelines proposed, Institutional Goals, Objectives and Action Plans were chalked out.
- In coherence with the Institutional Goals, Objectives and Action Plans, the departments drafted suitable goals, objectives and action plans focusing on SWOT status of the respective faculty groups.
- Simultaneously, IQAC designed a work plan structured into assessment criteria in order to facilitate the faculty to adhere to the master plan in all its endeavours.

The College has accomplished most of the plans to its satisfaction.

It is only when education integrates learning with the virtue of humanising and combines knowledge with wisdom that it becomes an answer to the problems of the nation and indeed the world. Educators; however, have to educate themselves consistently so as to be relevant in the constantly changing educational scenario. St. Agnes College has walked that extra mile by going in for NAAC re-accreditation for the fourth time. The college will continue to uphold the cause of providing quality education to the seekers of knowledge on this coastal belt of Karnataka.

The Second Party on its part is interested in associating with First Party for using their expertise to develop, promote and deliver the B.Com International Accounting & Finance which incorporates ACCA Curriculum as an Undergraduate Program of St Agnes College with their Academic Autonomy.





The purpose of this Memorandum of Understanding is to set forth the terms and conditions under which the Parties to this understanding shall conduct themselves during the subsistence of the Memorandum.

This Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") is not, and is not intended to be, legally binding except as specifically set out below.

- The First Party shall support the Second Party to develop the U G Program B.Com in International Accounting & Finance which incorporates ACCA Curriculum to
 meet the exemptions criteria of ACCA. That is the Students enrolled for this program
 can avail certain number of paper exemptions towards ACCA Qualification.
- 2. The Exemption Accreditation of U G Program B.Com in International Accounting & Finance is the discretion of ACCA. First or Second Party has no say on that. It is the responsibility of the Second Party to get the Government /Legal/University approval for running the program at St Agnes College. After the Final Exemption Accreditation, the final approved syllabus by Board of Studies and Academic Council of St Agnes College along with the details of exemptions for the program from ACCA will be given as Annexure 1.
- The First party can use the name of the St Agnes College for promoting the above two
 programs in advertisements and other modes of communications. The Promotion of the said
 programs has to be taken care jointly by the parties.
- The admission criteria and the number of seats for the above said programs are fixed by the Second Party in consultation with First Party.
- The First Party facilitates necessary train the trainer, consulting and technical support to the faculties of Second Party to deliver the U G Program - B.Com in International Accounting & Finance.
- The First Party provides Electronic Copy of relevant learning materials (For the integrated curriculum of ACCA subjects only) to the students enrolled for the above said Programs.
- 7. The First Party provides exam oriented training support to the students enrolled for the above program for their external examinations of ACCA. The number of hours per subject / paper/module is given as Annexure 2.
- The students enrolled for B.Com International Accounting & Finance is given the
 opportunity to attend the examination of Certificate in IFRS of ACCA as a part of their
 program.





- 9. All responsibilities regarding registration of the students with ACCA should be dealt with by the First Party. The students have to follow the Rules and Regulations of ACCA to appear for the examination and pursue the qualifications.
- 10. The fee to ACCA has to be paid by the students directly as per the Annexure 3.
- 11. Out of the Tuition Fees Collected, the Second Party has to make the necessary payment to the First party as per the table given below:

- 12. The Second Party is not entitled to associate with any other person or company to provide ACCA training during the period of this MoU for this program.
- 13. The complete list of Students of the course shall be provided to the First Party by the Second Party. Changes in Students, if any, shall be communicated by the representative of the Second Party to the First Party immediately.
- 14. It is intended that the terms of this MoU will remain in force for an initial period of Three Years set out above ie, the completion of First Batch or is otherwise terminated in accordance with the provisions of Clause 15. The MoU can be extended for further periods after the expiry of Three Years upon the parties mutually agreeing such extension in writing. The terms of this Memorandum may be modified at any time by both parties on mutual consent.





Each party hereby confirms its agreement to the terms contained in this MOU on this 24th day of May, 2016.


